Passed Suddenly At Salt Lake City Sanitarium Sunday Last.

Mrs. Mary Jane Jackson Hanson, wife of Oscar C. Hansen, died Sunday last at a Salt Lake City sanitarium after an illness of about eleven weeks. With her husband and family Mrs. Hansen came to Price some five years ago from the state capital, where the Hansen family had made their home since. Deceased was an active worker in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and was held in the very highest esteem by all with whom she came in contact. At the time of her death she was state secretary of the primary association of Carbon county and also teacher in the Sunday school.

Besides her husband she leaves one brother, Thomas F. Jackson of Salt Lake City and six children. These are Oscar C. Hansen, Jr., now attending school at Staunton, Va., Frank, Eugene, Aaron, Gladys and Donald Hansen. Since the illness of the mother came on some eight weeks ago the baby has been cared for by Mrs. Ernest E. Horsley at the latter's home. The husband was in the Utah Basin country when word came of his wife's serious condition.

Monday Mrs. Hanson and the children, accompanied by the father, went from Price to the funeral, which was held Wednesday last with burial at City cemetery, Salt Lake City. Bishop Hunter of the Ninth ward conducted the brief services, which were necessarily short because of the influenza regulations. Prayer was offered by Elder George Simms, Bishop of the Third ward spoke of deceased's good qualities and devotion to family and church.
