Ostrich Feathers Now Stylish as Dress and Wrap Decorations—Long Astrich Boas Again in Fashion—Burnt Ostrich Feathers Look Like New Kind of Aigret—French Dancing Costume Trimmed With Feather Fringe—Sweet Potatoes and Ways to Prepare Them.

OSTRICH FEATHERS STYLISH DRESS AND WRAP TRIMMINGS Ostrich feathers are now a stylish dress and wrap decoration. They are used as fringe on the latest Paris model gowns, outlining the sleeves or neck. The ends are just neck length, fastening with a dainty rosette or bow. Long ostrich boas are again in fashion.

On hats little ostrich tips are used, encircling the crown at spaced intervals. The ultra fashion, however, is the plume, the burnt ostrich feather. This is the regular curled feather with the little feathery down all burned away by a process known to the manufacturers. The result looks like a new kind of aigret and has had a great success. Such feathers are uncured, but hang over in graceful curves. All sorts of tall, fountain-like fantasies are made from them, and they make a very striking panache that is the almost necessary adjunct of the small, solidly looking hat now in style for morning or afternoon tailored costumes.

For candied sweet potatoes cut par-boiled sweet potatoes into lengthwise slices and put them in a buttered pan. Cook for two minutes three-quarters of a cupful of sugar, a quarter of a cupful of water and two tablespoonsful of butter. Brush the potatoes with this and bake them. Bake them with the syrup as they cook until they are well candied.

Another good way is to slice lengthwise halved sweet potatoes, put them in a baking dish, pour melted butter over them and brown them in the oven. Still another way is to remove the insides from baked potatoes, season them well with melted butter, paprika, salt and mace, and return to the skins to brown.

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Scalloped sweet potatoes are made by slicing parboiled potatoes into a covered baking dish and covering them with well seasoned white sauce. On top of the sauce put some melted butter and crumbs and bake for about 20 minutes.

French fried sweet potatoes are truly a delicacy. To make them, cut in thick lengthwise sections some par-boiled sweet potatoes and place them in a frying basket, into deep hot fat. Brown delicately, drain and season with salt.

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LACKING KNOWLEDGE GOD'S PEOPLE PERISH

"My People Are Destroyed For Lack of Knowledge."

Jesus' Teachings Harmonized the Law and the Prophets—Jewish Doctors Had Failed to Teach the Deep Things of the Law—Opposition to Bible Study—Jews Typical of Spiritual Ignorance—Jewish Age and Harvest Typical of Gospel Age and Harvest.



August 15.—The Photo-Drama of Creation continues to awaken deep interest in Bible study. Its orderly presentation of the world's masterpieces of art illustrative of sacred history is very impressive. Every subject dear to the Christian is depicted.

Pastor Russell preached today from the text, "Wee unto you, lawyers! for ye have taken away the Key of Knowledge; ye entered not in yourselves, and them that were entering in ye hindered."—Luke 11:52. The word lawyer in New Testament usage, the Pastor began, has a very different meaning from our usage. It applied to those religious teachers of the Jews who made special professions of sanctity of heart and earnest desire to know God's will and to teach it. Today the corresponding class are designated Doctors of Divinity.

It was customary amongst the Jews, the speaker continued, that lessons from the Law and the Prophets should be read daily in the synagogues. The people were thus familiar with the letter of the Scriptures. The majority of them were illiterate; for educational facilities then were not what they are now. Consequently only a few claimed to have knowledge of the spiritual part of the Law and Prophets. These were chiefly of the literary and wealthy classes. To these the common people looked for guidance.

But is Knowledge Necessary? It was then shown that in our Lord's day the Jewish Doctors of Divinity contented themselves with telling the people what to do and what not to do, but did not help them to understand the deep meaning of the Law and the Prophets. So it is today, the speaker declared, a minister stands as a representative and mouthpiece of the Church creed, which in roundabout terms declares that whoever does not live a saintly life will suffer an eternity of torment. Is not this a grievous burden to put upon any conscientious soul? he asked. Has it not caused untellable anguish to many of God's true people? Has it not driven from God and the Bible thousands of the most intelligent minds in the world?

As the Jewish Doctors of Divinity carried no such burdens, neither do Christendom's Doctors of Divinity. In private they acknowledge that they carry no such burdens. In public they give the inference that they do not—so much by positive terms as by implication, tone, inflection of the voice and by the fact that they represent creeds which so teach. These influential teachers are not to be excused because of the claim that in their official capacity they lose their personal responsibility and shift it upon those who made the creeds and those who adopted them. The people no longer trust the creeds. They realize that a greater light shines today than when those creeds were formulated.

The people trust the Bible, the Pastor declared. "They understand our modern Scribes and Pharisees to give assurance that the creeds of Christendom properly represent the teachings of Scripture. The creedal chains would become ropes of sand if the prominent Doctors of Divinity would publicly renounce the creeds, as nearly all of them do in private conversation."

Systematic Key-Hiding. Next it was pointed out that our modern Scribes and Pharisees are proving themselves to be the antitypes of those addressed by Jesus. Taking away the Key of Knowledge, they urge the people not to bother their heads about doctrines, but to leave these subjects to the clergy. Bible study has degenerated into a study of geography, customs, etc., rather than an effort to understand the prophesies or the interpretation of them given by Jesus and His Apostles.

REFUGEES LAND A BAGGAGELESS LOT

Americans Who Fled from Europe Arrive Empty Handed on the Celtic.

New York, Aug. 15.—Another baggageless lot of Americans who fled Europe today on the Celtic. The cabins were jammed and the stewards had a hard time feeding the throng.

In the first class cabin were 394 persons, in the second 606 and in the steerage 656.

W. H. Vanderpoel, son-in-law of C. K. G. Billings, was a passenger on the Celtic with his wife, child and Miss Billings. He said they were in Paris when the condition of affairs became alarming. The party left on a crowded train for Calais.

The Celtic took a northerly course and steamed without lights at night, but the trip was without incident.

Other passengers were Mrs. Alfred Vanderpoel and son; Captain C. A. Barbour, Ernest Iselin and Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Westinghouse.

More than a hundred persons of means were in the steerage of the Celtic because of the congestion on board. One passenger, who fortunately obtained first cabin accommodations, refused an offer of \$2700 for a state room.

The Celtic's passengers appointed a committee to send resolutions to President Wilson, thanking him for the interest he has shown in getting stranded tourists out of Europe.

Rotterdam, via London, 2:20 p. m., Aug. 15.—The Noordam sails for New York at 4 o'clock this afternoon, carrying 344 first class passengers and 405 second class passengers. No passenger list was obtainable.

Washington, Aug. 15.—On instructions from Brussels the Belgian legation has notified the consular agents throughout the United States that no more reservists are to be returned to Belgium until further notice.
