It was please answer the following question in your next issue: 'Does every naturalized citizen of the United States have to produce their naturalization papers to the registration officer when applying to be registered, previous to the coming election?'

C. T. Marx, Section 207 of the Revised Statutes of Utah makes it illegal, which answers the above question: 'When a naturalized citizen applies for registration, his certificate of naturalization, or a certified copy thereof, must be produced.'—Ex.
