## MAGAZINE ARTICLES BELIEVED TO BLAME FOR MAN'S DOWNFALL

Walter M. Hampton in Jail Under \$1000 Bail, Invertebrate Reader of Get-rich-quick Stories, Friends Say

Articles which recently appeared in a prominent national weekly magazine containing a history of forgery and other get-rich-quick schemes, which were thoroughly read by Walter M. Hampton, former bookkeeper for the Johnson-Stevens company and the Golden Rule store, now in the county jail charged with forgery, are believed to have been responsible for leading the young man astray.

This is the opinion of persons who were close friends of the young man and knew intimately his craving for reading matter pertaining to forgery and other crimes. Inquiry this morning made apparent the fact that Hampton was a confirmed reader of the particular magazine containing the articles and that he made special efforts to obtain a copy of this weekly each week as soon as it was placed on sale in Ogden.

Hampton waived preliminary hearing before the city court this morning when he appeared on a forgery charge. Bail was fixed at \$1000 by Judge D. R. Roberts.

It is believed that Hampton, almost crazed with worry as to how to gain finances for his coming marriage, read the articles in the national magazine and after sleepless nights in which he thrashed over in his mind his financial condition, decided to take the plunge. He adopted a scheme similar to that explained in the articles, but failed to carry it through to success.

Good Reference R. W. Stevens, manager of the Johnson-Stevens company which is the general offices of the Golden Rule stores, and where Hampton was arrested yesterday morning, said today that the man had come there for work offering exceptionally fine references. The recommendations as to his character were signed by a Utah senator and other prominent men of the state. Further inquiry before Hampton was finally employed brought replies which left no doubt as to the integrity of Hampton, Mr. Stevens declared.

## SWAINS FIGHT TO DEATH FOR LOVE OF PRETTY GIRL

NEEDLES, Cal., May 14.—Juan Sones and Emilio Reyes killed each other today in what the police said was a duel for the affection of a young Spanish woman, who recently came here from Los Angeles, Cal.

According to the police, the men met early today. Sones armed with a dagger and Reyes with a knife. Sones stabbed Reyes six times. The latter, realizing his wounds were mortal, drew a revolver and shot and killed Sones. When the police arrived the two bodies were lying clasped together as they had fallen. The young woman was prostrated and was removed to a hospital for treatment.

## INDIANA SPLITS ITS DELEGATION

Ten Instructed for Gen. Wood, Four for Johnson and 16 Uninstructed

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 14.—Indiana will send ten delegates to the Republican national convention in Chicago next month instructed for Major General Leonard Wood; four instructed for Senator Hiram Johnson of California and sixteen uninstructed. This was one of the net results of the Republican state convention that adjourned sine die last night after nominating a state ticket, adopting a platform and electing four delegates-at-large to the national convention.

The only contest of the committee came over the adoption of a qualified resolution, instructing the "big four" to support General Wood, who won the plurality vote in the primary last week. The resolution was carried after a hard fight, led by the Marion county (Indianapolis) delegation, by a vote of 752 to 746.

Wins Senate Nomination. The text of the peace plank incorporated in the party's platform, charged President Wilson with being responsible for the delay in ratifying the peace treaty.

"The treaty of peace with Germany ought to have been made immediately after the armistice," the text reads. "If that had been done, the treaty would have been ratified many months ago."

The party favors an association of nations to promote the peace of the world, the text declared. "We favor the establishment of a world court to administer international justice and also earnestly support a general agreement among nations for a reduction of armaments; but we are unalterably opposed to any league or covenant which gives to foreign nations, in any way whatever, the slightest control over the military and naval forces of the United States or which gives a foreign country a tribunal the least jurisdiction over the domestic affairs of the American people."

Birmingham, Ala., May 14.—Official returns from 63 of the 67 counties in the state in Tuesday's Democratic senatorial primary give Senator Oscar W. Underwood a plurality of 10,381 over L. B. Musgrove, the union labor candidate, and a majority of 1,830 over Musgrove and Judge Sam D. Weakley. Underwood's vote was 65,272; Musgrove's 54,886 and Weakley's 8,551.

In the race for the nomination for the short term in the senate, Representative Hefflin has a plurality of 12,224. His total vote is 35,252.

## U. S. MARITIME POLICY NEEDED

Speaker Holds Seapower Is Necessary to Development of Foreign Trade

SAN FRANCISCO, May 14.—An American maritime policy eliminating federal control is necessary for the development of successful American commerce, it was stated today in a report in the merchant marine committee of the national foreign trade council, read by Wellington Ring, of New York, before the council's seventh annual session here.

The foreign trade council has placed on record its conviction that American shipyards will be able to provide tonnage at rates and under conditions that will compare favorably with those obtained in foreign maritime countries.

Ring pointed out that where foreign countries have advantage of cheaper labor, American shipyards are compensated by a greater efficiency of labor and steel ship building material is \$40 a ton cheaper in this country than abroad.

Ring spoke in place of William H. Knox, of New York, who was unable to attend the convention.

## HYDROPLANE AND DOCTOR ARRIVE JUST TOO LATE

PANAMA, May 14.—Three Americans, one of them an octogenarian, alone on a plantation in the interior eighty miles up the Atlantic coast, died of tropical fever one after another, last week, while a hydroplane carrying a doctor and medicine was being hurried to their relief. It was learned on the seaplane's return. The victims were E. McGuire, 64 years old, H. W. Davis, 87, and J. W. Leath, 70, all of Los Angeles.
