J. A. SCHELIN'S BURNS FROM GASOLINE EXPLOSION IN HIS HOME PROVE TO BE FATAL

John Alvin Schelin, 2919 Grant avenue, died at the Dee hospital at 3:40 a. m., today as the result of burns received yesterday morning through the explosion of gasoline in his home. Mr. Schelin was burned so terribly that all efforts to save his life were unavailing.

Mr. Schelin was born September 21, 1860, in Sweden, and came to Ogdens July 7, 1885. He lived for some time at Huntsville, where he conducted a blacksmith shop. He had been employed as a blacksmith and toolmaker for the Southern Pacific Railroad company for twenty-six years.

Mr. Schelin and his wife, then unmarried, were about 20 years old when they emigrated to this country. They were in the same company. In Sweden they became acquainted with C. J. A. Lindquist of Ogdens, who filled a two-year mission for the Latter-day Saints church.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Organization of four more regiments of cavalry, in accordance with recommendations from General Pershing, has been ordered by the war department in addition to the complete cavalry division of the regular army already under way.

CHICAGO, March 8.—Chicago liquor interests obtained a victory today when the board of election commissioners decided that the board has the power to investigate the validity of certain signatures on the petition to put the liquor question up to the voters of Chicago at the April election.

TEN THOUSAND CANE FIELD MEN STRIKE

SAN JUAN, P. R., March 8.—Ten thousand cane field laborers in the eastern end of the island are on strike causing the closing down of three sugar centrals. The men declare they are tired of waiting for action by the labor officials at Washington which would determine whether a general strike would be called.

Reports from Porto Rico as long ago as last December indicated the possibility of a general strike of between 50,000 and 60,000 laborers in the Porto Rican sugar industry because of dissatisfaction among the laborers over hours and wages. They asked an increase of 60 cents a day over the rate paid last year and appeals for assistance were sent to Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and to Secretary of Labor Wilson.

Clearings—The report of the Ogdens Clearing House association shows today's total clearings were \$279,449.75. On the same date in 1917, the total clearings were \$252,438.43. The increase for March 8, 1918, over the same date last year is \$27,011.32.
