SEATTLE, Wash., March 23.—The Pacific Coast International league, formerly the Northwest league, will not be cut from six to four clubs, Robert Blewett, of Seattle, president of the league, has asserted.

MIKE DONOVAN CALLED BY DEATH

NEW YORK, March 24.—Mike Donovan, former middleweight champion pugilist, and widely known as boxing instructor of Theodore Roosevelt when the colonel was president of the United States, died of pneumonia at a hospital here early today.

"Professor" Donovan, as he was called by Colonel Roosevelt and those under his instruction during the thirty years he supervised boxing at the New York Athletic club, held the friendship of many of the most prominent men of the country.

The former champion was born in Chicago 71 years ago. He served with the Seventy-first Illinois volunteers throughout the Civil war.

Later Donovan claimed the middleweight championship of the world and successfully defended the title, until his retirement. Although he never weighed more than 156 pounds during his ring career, Donovan twice met John L. Sullivan and other heavyweights.
