No Pretext for Ambiguity or Misconstruction Found in President Wilson's Answer. LONDON, Oct. 16.—Declaring that very allied country will endorse President Wilson's note to Germany, the Chronicle says: "There is no closing of the door of negotiation and yet there is no opening for a sidetracking correspondence. There is in the note no pretext for ambiguity or misconstruction."

BAVARIANS MEET MANY DEATHS SEVERE DEFEAT FROM INFLUENZA

Best of Men Put in Front and Are Mowed Down By Advancing British. Over 6,112 Die in 30 Cities—4,409 of Pneumonia in Week. WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—There were 6,112 deaths from Spanish influenza in thirty cities the week ending October 12, as compared with 19 the week ending September 14 when the disease got its first foothold in New England. In the same period there were 4,409 deaths from pneumonia.

MORONI SKEEN HEAD OF THE REPUBLICANS. Moroni Skeen was named chairman of the Republican Central committee of Weber county and W. E. Zuppman was elected secretary at a meeting of the committee and candidates held last night. It was also decided to immediately open the party's headquarters in Ogden and to name special committees to handle details of the campaign.

High Court to Try Ex-Premier Caillaux. PARIS, Tuesday, Oct. 15.—Edouard Ignace, under secretary of state for justice, reported to the cabinet today on his investigation of the charges against former Premier Caillaux, Deputy Louis Lortal and Paul Comby. The cabinet immediately issued a decree conking the high court to meet October 29 to try the charges of criminal attempts against the state, under which the three men are held.

QUESTIONNAIRES FOR THE BRITISH GERMAN MAKING DESPERATE FIGHT

Armies Everywhere in France Trying to Hold Back Their Foes. (By the Associated Press.) The entente forces in Belgium and France continue successfully to drive the enemy before them. In Belgian Flanders the advance is somewhat rapid, but on all the sectors in France the Germans are fighting with desperation to hold back their foes.

SEVEN QUARTS OF WHISKEY FOUND

REPARATION FOR HUN DAMAGES

France Begins Action to Force Atonement by the German. PARIS, Thursday, Oct. 15.—(Havas)—The French senate unanimously today adopted a resolution proposed by the government, permitting the government to proceed actively in co-operation with the allies with plans to obtain reparation for damage committed by the Germans. Stephen Pichon, the foreign minister, declared that he should have more power to insist upon the just claims against Germany.

BACKING UP THE LIBERTY BONDS

Backing the President's appeal for unanimous support of the Fourth Liberty Loan the United War Work Campaign cabinet, adopted the following resolutions at its meeting in San Francisco. Inasmuch as President Wilson has today issued a statement to the nation calling upon us not to relax our efforts in any way in order to make a success of the Fourth Liberty Loan, it is the sense of this meeting, which represents the seven great welfare organizations of the country in the Western military division, namely, the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., National Catholic War Council (Knights of Columbus), American Library Association, Salvation Army, Jewish Welfare Board and the War Camp Community Service, that the entire force of these organizations throughout the country be made available in as large degree as possible to back up our President in the Fourth Liberty Loan drive.

Eight Million Pounds of T. N. T. By Army Plane

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Eight million pounds of T. N. T. were saved from destruction during the recent fire at the Gillespie shell loading plant at Morgan, N. J., by an army airplane which flew over the wrecked works at an altitude of 1,000 feet and directed the light against the flames. The war department announced the feat today by Lieutenant Cyrus F. Smythe, with Major H. L. Armstrong as observer.

MRS. E. T. BARTON DIES IN SALT LAKE

SALT LAKE, Oct. 16.—Mrs. E. T. Barton, wife of Lieutenant E. T. Barton of Camp Fremont, Cal., died of Spanish influenza in Salt Lake yesterday. Her husband heard of her illness and then her death, but was powerless to come to her side because he too had contracted the disease. Mrs. Barton visited her husband at the camp in California and a week ago he accompanied her on her return to Salt Lake. He went back to duty at once. Mrs. Barton fell sick with Spanish influenza shortly after his departure. The lieutenant was notified but word was received that he had also contracted the disease and was seriously ill. Lieutenant Barton entered the camp in September and was commissioned November 27, 1917.

FIRE OF UNKNOWN ORIGIN IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 16.—Thousands of persons stood today on the waterfront hills here and watched flames destroy a big Northern Pacific Railway company oil dock. Blazing fire sprang over the Puget sound waters around the dock and halted attempts of tugs to pull out two Japanese liners moored at an adjoining dock. Only one of the liners was damaged seriously.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION—HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NUMBER EIGHT

A resolution proposing an amendment to Section 1, Article 13 of the Constitution of the State of Utah, relating to uniform taxes and exemptions. It is resolved by the Legislature of the State of Utah, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring therein: That it is proposed to amend Section 3 of Article XIII of the Constitution of the State of Utah so that the same will read as follows: Section 3. The Legislature shall provide by law a uniform and equal rate of assessment for taxation on all property in the State, according to its value in money, and shall prescribe by general law such regulations as shall secure a just valuation for taxation of all property, so that every person and corporation shall pay a tax in proportion to the value of his, her or its property. Provided, that a deduction of debts from credits may be authorized: Provided further, That the property of the United States, of the State, counties, cities, towns, school districts, municipal corporations and public libraries, lots with buildings thereon used exclusively for either religious or educational purposes, and places of burial not held or used for private or corporate benefit, shall be exempt from taxation. Ditches, canals, reservoirs, irrigation canals, flumes owned and used by individuals, and corporations for irrigating lands owned by such individuals or corporations, or the individual members thereof, shall not be assessed as long as they shall be owned and used exclusively for such purposes: Provided further, That the taxes of the indigent property shall be exempt from taxation: Provided further, That the taxes of the indigent and in such manner as may be provided by law: Provided, further, That the Legislature may provide for the exemption from taxation of homes, homesteads, and personal property not to exceed two hundred and fifty dollars in value for some and homesteads and one hundred dollars of personal property. Section 2. The Secretary of State is directed to cause to be printed and published as required by the Constitution and to be submitted to the electors of the State at the next general election in the manner provided by law. Section 3. If approved by the electors of the State, this proposed amendment shall take effect on the first day of January, 1919. Approved March 12, 1917. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION—HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NUMBER NINE

A joint resolution providing for an amendment to Section 4, Article 13, of the Constitution of the State of Utah, relating to the taxation of mines and mining property, the assessments of same. It is resolved by the Legislature of the State of Utah, two-thirds of the members elected to the two houses concurring therein: That it is proposed to amend Section 4, Article 13 of the Constitution of the State of Utah so that the same will read as follows: Section 4. All metalliferous mines or mining claims, both placer and rock in place, shall be assessed at \$5.00 per acre, and in addition thereto, the value of the mineral deposits in such lands containing coal or hydro-carbons shall be assessed at their full value. All machinery, tools, and other property used in the improvement upon or development of a mine or mining claim, and the value of any surface improvements upon or development of a mine or mining claim, or mining property, shall be assessed at full value. The state board of equalization shall assess and tax all property belonging to the State of Utah, and the assessment of \$5.00 per acre and the assessment of the value of any use other than for mining purposes, shall be provided for by law. Section 2. The Secretary of State is hereby directed to submit this proposed amendment to the electors of the State at the next general election in the manner prescribed by law. Section 3. If adopted by the electors of the State, this amendment shall take effect January 1st, 1919. Approved March 12, 1917.
