INFLUENZA IS SPREADING OVER ENTIRE NATION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18—Restrictions on the use of sugar during November and December were announced by the food administration tonight.

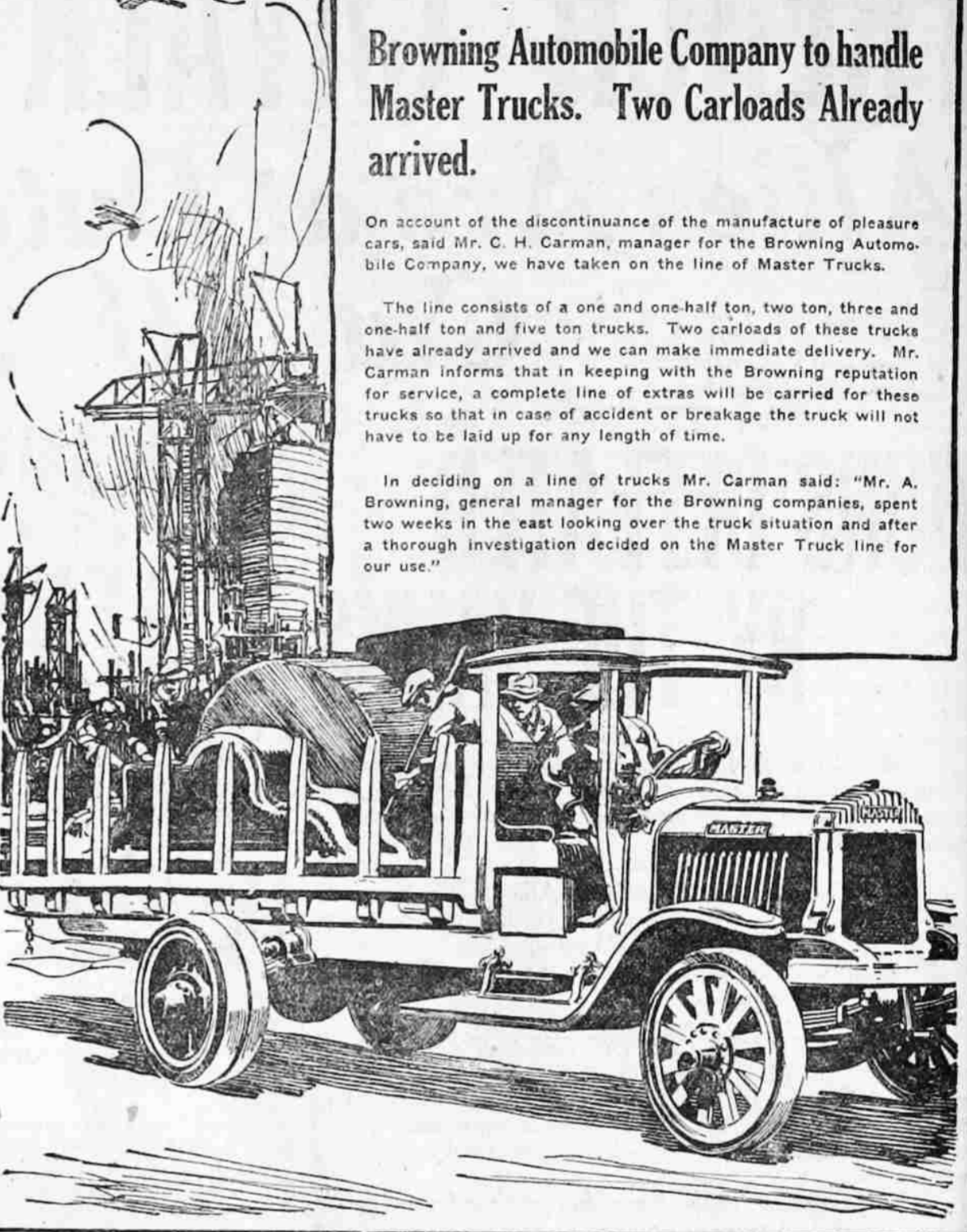
Children Must Play in Own Back Yards in City of Chicago
