GERMANS PUT UP A POOR FIGHT

Americans Carry Apex of Advance to Lake in Belval Wood—Retreating Huns Bombed.

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES ON THE VERDUN FRONT, Nov. 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—Only disorganized resistance was offered by the Germans today to the French and American troops from points east of the river Meuse, to that part of the line extending to Rehnet. The Americans carried the apex of their advance to the little lake in Belval woods to the north of Barri-court. Stenay, an important railway center less than four miles from the American front has already been so harassed that it has been rendered almost useless to the enemy. The Germans continue to retreat all along the front. The retreating German troops and convoys and enemy ammunition dumps and various villages within the Teuton lines were attacked today by American bombing airplanes. Great damage is reported to have been done to property and consternation caused among the retreating troops. The American bombing machines made two attacks, the first in the morning and the other in the afternoon, reaching as far as Stenay and Beaumont. Fires are reported in both places. Eight squadrons participated in the air raids today. The bombers attacked Beaumont where they destroyed a warehouse and exploded an ammunition dump. At Stenay another ammunition dump was exploded. The bombers also attacked Martincourt, Mousseay, Beaulair and Beaufort. The last two towns simultaneously were under the fire of American heavy guns. In the region of Vaux and Sommau the pursuit planes harassed the troops along the roadways with machine guns and small bombs. The weather was cloudy but it was the first really clear day on the ground since the offensive of the Americans was resumed. There were various combats in the air. Two German machines were reported brought down. Three American planes are missing.

Retreat Southeast of Valenciennes.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Germans are retreating to the east and southeast of Valenciennes, Field Marshal Haig reports from headquarters tonight. The British are following the enemy up and taking prisoners. Pershing's Men Go Forward. WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES NORTHWEST OF VERDUN, Nov. 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Pershing's forces continued to make satisfactory progress during the night and this morning, but they met with isolated opposition here and there indicating that the German retreat had slightly slowed up. Virtually every American division had not only reached its objectives this morning but was far ahead of them. Prisoners, guns and material were reported to be increasing in number and quantity. The enemy opposition took the form of intermittent artillery fire and at a few points with the use of gas and infantry. This resistance, however, generally vanished when the Americans exerted themselves. The general character of the enemy's defense was almost exclusively that of rear guard actions, instead of the usual bitter direct opposition and generally it was overcome with-out difficulty.

Aviators See Great Crowds

The aviators report, regarding the retreat of the enemy east of the Meuse is as follows: "At Removille a troop train of nineteen cars was leaving, northward bound. We saw great crowds of enemy troops along the railway siding. We fired upon them and they fled back with incendiary bullets. All northbound roads out of Removille were filled with troops."

Argonne Region Clear.

PARIS, Nov. 3.—The Argonne region has been cleared of the enemy by the French and American forces, the war office announces tonight. Numerous villages and important positions were captured in Sunday's fighting.

Successful Saturday Battles

WITH THE ITALIAN FORCES IN NORTHERN ITALY, Saturday, Nov. 2, 3 p. m. (By the Associated Press.)—The Italian forces with the Italians and their allies completed the destruction of Austria's mighty army. It is estimated that 3,000 Austrian cannon will be the total taken by the Italians in addition to vast quantities of other war material. The allied forces are ever pressing on toward the frontier in the mountains. They have already reached the Val Sugana where the Italians are holding their line of a year ago. The Austrians are leaving their wounded by the roadside or houses. Two thousand Austrian wounded were deserted in Feltré without attendance or medicine. The civil population everywhere complains that they were stripped of everything of value by the enemy in the invaded provinces. Thousands of cannon are being captured by the Italians in addition to great quantities of war material. At Vittorio a big petroleum deposit was found, the Austrians not taking the trouble to burn it. Great quantities of telegraph wire were left undestroyed. At Belluno, a large depot of food and material was found by the Italians. The allies frequently captured long trains of artillery, one train being taken at Razi, it having been abandoned by the retreating Austrians in their haste. It was on October 29 that the enemy received a mortal blow by a main attack across the river Piave. This permitted the Eighth army to move to Vittorio and gave the Fourth army a chance to operate. Then piece by piece, corps by corps, and division by division, the Austrian armies have fallen. When the Italian

Fourth army reached Monte Cismon, at the junction of the Brenta, it gave the Twelfth army a chance to operate at Feltré, in the upper Piave valley, and also permitted the Sixth army to go into action in the Asiago district. Between the Fourth and Sixth armies the chief Austrian resistance in Italy was broken. It was in the mountains that the greatest number of cannon was taken. ROME, Saturday, Nov. 2.—Italian cavalry patrols have crossed the Tagliamento river at Spilimbergo, which city has been occupied, according to the official statement issued at the war office today. The statement reads: "The first army has captured Monte Majò and attacked Passo Della Borcol. In the Posina sector we have taken Monte Cismon, on the Tonzzo plateau and after ascending the Assa valley, we occupied Lastebasse. "On the Asiago plateau the allies have captured a great number of prisoners and guns. The advance continues. There have been lively rear-guard combats west of Castelnuovo, in the Saguna valley, and at Ponte Della Serra, in the Cismon valley. "In the Cordevole valley our advance guards have reached Mis. "Our cavalry have occupied Spilimbergo and Fordenone and the fighting has reached the east bank of the Tagliamento, across which patrols have been thrown. "In the plains, the heads of our columns have reached the line of Azzanocellino, Portogruaro, Concordia and Sottobelluno. "The number of captured prisoners and the amount of booty is increasing everywhere."
