D. O. M'KAY ADVISES VOTE "YES" ON PROHIBITION

On Tuesday, Nov. 5, 1918, the people of this state are asked to vote for or against three proposed amendments to the state constitution.

Undoubtedly, public sentiment in Utah is overwhelmingly favorable to the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages.

There being such a general approval of the law, it would appear that the only danger to the registering of practically a one hundred per cent affirmative vote on this question would be either indifference or forgetfulness.

Such an amendment will lower the tone of our constitution. The only basis for such an objection must lie in the assumption either that the law now on the statute books is not fundamental, or that it has not practically the unanimous support and sympathy of the people.

In answer to the first assumption, I should like to say just this: In spite of occasional "bootlegging," prohibition in Utah as elsewhere has reduced to a remarkable degree the evils that followed in the path of intemperance.

Now as to the second condition on which the objection must be based. Of course, before a law is made part of the constitution, it should have practically the unanimous support of the electorate.

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WM. H. STRATTON DIES SUDDENLY WHILE ON DUCK HUNT

William Henry Stratton, 2726 Monroe avenue, son of William and Sarah Jane Stratton of Riverdale, died at 6:30 p. m. Saturday, of heart failure, while hunting ducks on the South Run west of Hooper.

Stratton was born in Riverdale December 18, 1895, and lived in Weber county most of his life. He was in partnership with his brother, Arthur E. Stratton, in the automobile repairing business, Twenty-first street and Washington avenue.

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Senator Joseph Chez Candidate for Re-Election

Re-nominated by the Democratic Party for the Office of State Senator from Weber County

Oregon to Elect U. S. Senators and Three Congressmen

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 4.—Two United States senators, three congressmen, a governor, state treasurer, justice of the supreme court, attorney general, superintendent of public instruction, labor commissioner, public service commissioner and two superintendents of water divisions are to be chosen by Oregon voters tomorrow.

United States Senator Charles L. McNary, Republican, appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late Senator Harry Lane, is a candidate for a new full term, although the unexpired term will not end until March 4, 1919.

Both Sides Claim Victory in State of Utah

The following forecasts of the results of the election tomorrow in Utah are from the Republican and Democratic state headquarters.

Chairman Republican State Committee

Utah is normally a Republican state. She has been one of the few states occasionally by some deceptive slogan such as "He kept us out of war," but when the Republican party has been torn by factional strife and differences. This year, however, the Republicans are united. There are no factions.

A splendid state ticket for justices of the supreme court has been nominated. Two strong men of towering ability have been selected as congressmen; good, capable men have been nominated in the various counties for county officers and for the legislature.

Reports received from every county in the state indicate that the Republicans are alert, alive to the importance of the occasion and determined to resist at the polls the attempted distinction by Democrats as to how they shall vote. We expect to elect our nominees for justices of the supreme court, both our congressmen, a majority of the legislature and the county ticket in most of the counties of the state.

In my opinion President Wilson is stronger in this state than he was two years ago. At least 25,000 of our citizens are out of the state in the army and engaged in war work. The vote, therefore, will be less than that of two years ago, but the Democratic plurality will probably be proportionately larger. There are many Republicans like the late ambassador to the court of St. James, the Hon. Joseph H. Choate, who said in nearly his last public utterance at the time of the visit of Joffre and Balfour to the United States:

"I am one of those who complained of watchful waiting. I have criticized the president on account of his refusal to become embroiled with Mexico. I have been impatient because he held aloof from the present war in Europe until convinced that the hour was ripe and his people ready to enter it. But time has changed my viewpoint, and closer acquaintance with the facts of which he was cognizant has convinced me of his wisdom. To have followed any other course would have suited our enemies and endangered our future."

MORONI SKEEN Candidate for County Commissioner on Republican Ticket. The platform of Commissioner Skeen, candidate for re-election to the Weber county board of commissioners, has been the building of permanent roads. His record as a road builder and as a constructionist for Weber county is well known, his constant effort having been to develop the highways of the county. During his administration, Weber county's debt has been reduced over \$100,000. He has always been the friend of the poor and the needy appealing to the county for help and assistance "over the rough spots of life," and has worked in perfect harmony with all charitable societies and ward relief organizations. His record in every possible effort to reduce county expense and taxes shows a consistent and persistent fight to save money for the tax payers. He is also an advocate of reduction of the force of county deputies and other appointive officials.
