LIBAU SEIZED BY GERMAN TROOPS, LETTISH GOVERNMENT OVERTHROWN AND BRITISH WARSHIPS ARE PREPARING FOR ACTION

DISPUTE MUST BE SETTLED

Italy Demands Decision on Fiume and Dalmatia.
PLANS DELAYED
Germans Will Not Be Permitted to Discuss Terms.

COPENHAGEN, April 18—German and Baltic-German troops have forcibly seized Libau and overthrown the Lettish provisional government, according to advices received by the Lettish press bureau here.

 Conflicting claims to the city of Fiume and the Dalmatian coast which have been laid before the peace conference in Paris by Italy and Jugoslavia probably will be brought to a decision soon.

This controversy has aroused public sentiment in Italy and when the Italian parliament meets April 24 it is probable Premier Orlando will be asked for a report on the subject. Hence, he is said especially to desire a settlement before that date.

German Success Described
 WASHINGTON, April 18—State department advices from Libau today by way of Copenhagen described the German success in overthrowing the provisional government of Lettish Wednesday, when officials of the government were imprisoned. The Germans, the dispatch reported, seized the treasury notes of the provisional government and now are in absolute control of the situation. The coup was said to have been carried out under the guise of suppression of the Bolsheviki.

DANIELS SEES MEN ON DUTY

Has First Glimpse of U. S. Marines Patrolling the Rhine River.
VISITS HUN FORTRESS
Inspects First American Artillery Unit Ever Fully Equipped With Motors.

COBLENZ, Thursday, April 17 (By the Associated Press)—From a parapet of the fortress Ehrenbreitstein, more than four hundred feet above the junction of the Moselle and Rhine, Secretary Josephus Daniels of the United States navy, had his first glimpse this afternoon of American marines on duty. Patrol boats were darting back and forth among the barges and tugs on the river, the American flag streaming from the stern mast of each little boat.

At the point where the Moselle joins the Rhine stands a heroic statue of Emperor William I, said to be the largest of its kind in Germany. Beyond the statue there are great piles of lumber which aroused Secretary Daniels' curiosity as he looked down upon the activity of Coblenz which has been increased two-fold by the American occupation of the city. It was explained to him that the lumber was intended for new buildings which will serve as recreation centers and barracks for the American soldiers of the army of occupation.

BURLESON TAKES HAND IN STRIKE

Submits Demands of Telephone Workers to General Manager of Company.

BOSTON, April 18—Leaders of the striking telephone workers conferred today regarding Postmaster-General Burleson's plan for breaking the deadlock that has arisen in connection with their demands for wage increases and the privilege of collective bargaining. Mr. Burleson yesterday sent word to the operators' committee that as they had failed to adopt his suggestion that they place their proposed wage scale before the general manager of the company, William R. Driver, Jr., he (Mr. Burleson) had decided to take the initiative in their behalf and had submitted their demand to Mr. Driver.

Pichard Crane to Be First Minister to New Republic

WASHINGTON, April 18—Selection of Richard Crane, private secretary to Secretary Lansing since 1915, to be first American minister to the new republic of Czechoslovakia was announced at the state department today by Acting Secretary Polk.

U. S. CITY MANAGER RULES ALONG RHINE



H. M. Waite is a city manager in Dayton, O. before he entered the army as a colonel of engineers. Now he's manager of a score of German cities—in the American zone of occupation. Waite finds the German city governments are efficient and that the mayors are able to give him data the day it is asked for and his staff expected would require weeks to compile. "Beyond doubt, the German mayor knows his job," says Waite, "but the whole democratic spirit of our manager cities is missing."

BIG FOUR MEET AT WHITE HOUSE

PARIS, April 18—With the return of David Lloyd George, the British premier, from his visit home, for his house of commons address, the council of four, comprising the British, French and Italian premiers and President Wilson, resumed its deliberations today. The "big four" met in the Paris "White House."

Driving Storm Stops Activities of the Aviators

PRES. WILSON SENDS AN ORDER

Directs Industrial Board to Re-open Discussion of Price Stabilization.
CABLES HITCHCOCK
Retiring Senate Chairman Congratulated for Cheering Message.

WASHINGTON, April 18—President Wilson has directed the industrial board of the department of commerce and the railroad administration to re-open discussion of price stabilization and endeavor to find a common ground upon which they can agree.

ARCHANGEL, Thursday, April 17 (By the Associated Press)—The Bolsheviki have evacuated the town of Bolshe Ozerki, according to peasants who fled to the Allied lines yesterday. The enemy evidently was driven out by the constant shelling to which the Russo-Allied artillery has been subjecting the town during the last two weeks.

TROOPS ARRIVE FROM MARSEILLES

Entire Personnel of 83rd That Fought With Italians Against Austria Landed.

NEW YORK, April 18—With the arrival on the steamship Dante Alighiere from Marseilles today of 28 officers and 687 men of the 32nd regiment of infantry, 82d division, composed of national army troops from Ohio and western Pennsylvania, the entire personnel of that infantry organization, which fought with the Italians against Austria, has been landed and sent to training camps preparatory for demobilization.

Cairo Public Service Paralyzed by the Spreading Strikes

CAIRO, Egypt, Thursday, April 18—The city was outwardly calm early today although a majority of the public services were paralyzed by the strikes which are extending rather than abating.

FARMS UNABLE TO SECURE MEN

Employment Service Meets With Little Success in Country Efforts.

VLADIVOSTOK, March 13—General Mitchenko has been shot, according to a statement made to a member of the British mission here by a Russian aviator who deserted from the Red army in January and flew into the lines of Admiral Kolchak's army.

German Army Trucks Shipped to America For Mechanics' Study

COBLENZ, March 25—Twenty German army trucks of various types were shipped recently from Coblenz to the war department at Washington for observation by mechanics of the motor transportation service of the army.

Statistics Show Big Increase in American Trade

WASHINGTON, April 18—Continued increase in the foreign trade of the United States was shown in statistics made public today by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce. Exports in March were valued at \$605,000,000, as compared with \$588,000,000 in February this year and \$523,000,000 in March of last year.

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BERLIN, Wednesday, April 16 (By the Associated Press)—The German national government is considering seriously the sending of government troops, or at least German general staff officers, to aid in the relief of Munich from the communists forces, although neither the Bavarian nor the German governments wish to cause such an invasion of state rights if it can be avoided.
