CANTEEN MUST HAVE SUPPLIES FOR THE NINETY-FIRST

The women of Ogden are called upon to meet a real emergency tomorrow. About one week ago, when a morning paper announced that the Ninety-first division would pass through Ogden, a generous supply of provisions was secured to present them.

Now the Standard announces that the Ninety-first is rapidly approaching the canteen, and there is nothing to give them. It is clearly a case that involves the reputation and honor of Ogden and all the women are urged to commence work on cookies and doughnuts, sandwiches and just anything that will add to the pleasure of several hundred hungry men.

It is known that there are six sections to the train. This makes the call for provisions one of sufficient proportions to stir the men and women alike to prompt action.
Rev. Carson said this morning: "It is known that part of the Ninety-first will be here sometime within the next forty-eight hours. We expect them Saturday and I wish to make a straight appeal to the men and women of Ogden to assist the canteen by sending, or ordering sent, a generous supply of the things a soldier will appreciate. Cookies, doughnuts, sandwiches and other articles of refreshment are wanted. Those who cannot bake can serve in this stress by ordering from their baker. We ask for prompt action in order that our workers may have sufficient supplies for all needs."

LORIN FARR PARK IS ONLY BOND ISSUE LOST IN CITY

The city and county building was last by a majority of 425 votes in the combined vote of the city and county, according to the semi-official figures, which are the only figures that will be available until next Monday when the ballots are opened by the city commission.

All other measures in the triple bond election Wednesday were carried, with the possible exception of the Lorin Farr park bond issue of \$19,763. There are twelve districts in the city that had not reported the number of votes cast for and against the various measures. The judges of election made no note of how the votes went, but sealed the envelopes and returned them to the city recorder. Results in these districts will not be definitely known until the board of city commissioners open these envelopes and makes the official canvass next Monday at their regular meeting.

After the checking of the votes had been completed yesterday the two county measures, the joint building and the new county jail, stood as follows:

The Washington avenue park improvements has carried, unless there is a vote rolled up against it in the few remaining districts.
On the Lorin Farr park proposition there were 685 votes unfavorable and 632 favorable. As the remaining districts to be heard from are not far from the Lorin Farr park it is expected that the measure will carry.

The appropriation for the Washington avenue park improvements will mean that the children will have added playground improvements, new equipment and swimming pool.
Commissioner Miles L. Jones, head of the department of parks and public property, states that the Lorin Farr improvements will be made even if the bonds have failed to carry, there being enough means to take care of the improvements from the budget made for parks.

FULTON A BANKRUPT.
MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., April 18.—Fred Fulton, heavyweight pugilist, has filed a petition in bankruptcy in federal court here, it was announced today. Fulton lists his assets at \$7,360 and his liabilities at \$6,523. His liabilities are court judgments against him and promissory notes.

UTAH PROMISED \$300,000 WORTH OF ROAD TOOLS
SALT LAKE, April 18.—Utah will receive from the United States government for the construction of highways costing practically \$300,000. The only cost to the state, however, will be the freight. This conclusion was reached yesterday after a conference between Chief Engineer O. C. Merrill of the highway department of the govern-

This is to be distributed among the highway departments of the states for use in road construction.
