A plenary session of the peace conference will be held two days next week, Wednesday and Thursday, to pass upon a large number of remaining details before the meeting with the Germans.

Body of English Nurse Will Be Taken to England

LONDON, April 17.—(British Wireless Service)—The body of Edith Cavell, the English nurse who was executed by the Germans in 1915, at Brussels, will be brought to England May 15 and taken to Westminster Abbey where ceremonies will be held. The body will be brought to Dover on a warship and will be transported on a gun carriage with military escort to Victoria station and thence to Westminster Abbey. Interment will be at Norwich, the home town of the Cavells.

U. S. Army Balloons Make Safe Landings

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According to messages received here from Lieutenant Col. W. S. Wines, today his balloon landed at Cabot, Ark., at 2:25 p. m. The start was made last night at 10:29 o'clock with the intention of maintaining an altitude of 5,000 feet.

Other balloon piloted by Captain F. W. Goodale, landed at Arcola, Miss., at 1:25 p. m. It started last night at 10:47 o'clock. Messages indicate the trips were successful. Officials here had expected that the pilot would be in the air at least forty-eight hours.
