

PROMINENT RAILROAD MEN ARE IN CITY AND HALE HOLDEN TO ARRIVE THIS AFTERNOON

Regional Director Hale Holden of the United States railroad administration will arrive in Ogden this afternoon shortly after 1 o'clock. He will leave later in the afternoon for Salt Lake City.

COAL COMPANIES ARE CONSOLIDATED BY STOCKHOLDERS PROTECT IS MADE TO ROAD COMMISSION OF UTAH

At a meeting of the stockholders of the Lion and Watis coal companies held yesterday afternoon, it was decided to ratify the agreement between the directors of the two concerns through which a consolidation has been effected.

FINED \$250 FOR HIS PART IN LIQUOR STORAGE

After having been found guilty of having liquor in his possession by a jury of four in the city court, James H. Roberts was sentenced this morning to serve 180 days in the county jail or pay a fine of \$250.

The committee of citizens who accompanied the county commissioners to the meeting held yesterday afternoon with the state road commission in Salt Lake made a strenuous protest against the present plan of the commission to resurface with a bituminous material the three sections of state highway yet to be completed in Weber county.

only while cement, a Utah material, and particularly a great industry of Ogden, was not even mentioned. It was pointed out by the solid argument and by the facts and figures that cement is the best known material of which to construct a permanent base for road work.

The discussion of the subject brought out the fact that such a road would cost about \$20,000 per mile or about \$242,000 for the twelve miles of road to be constructed. State Engineer McGonagle reluctantly acknowledged that \$2600 was the amount of tribute which would be paid to the owners of the patented material which they proposed to use, this being in the nature of a royalty.

In response to a question he also said that he believed concrete was as good as bitulithic, but when asked why he did not favor concrete, a Utah material, he said that bitulithic was also a Utah material, and such a road as contemplated under the specifications would last about ten years.
