TROOPS IN FULL CONTROL

Officials Declare "Black Belt" Rioting "At an End."

HEAVY CASUALTIES

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—Law and order prevailed in Chicago today. Six thousand state troops patrolled the scene of the recent race riots on the south side but they had little to do.

PREDICT STRIKE TO END

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DAVENPORT STRIKE

DAVENPORT, Ia., Aug. 1.—Employees of the Tri-City Railway company early this morning voted unanimously to strike. The strike tied up street car transportation in Davenport, Ia., Rock Island and Moline, Ill., and adjacent towns and on the Muscatine, Ia., and the Davenport & Clinton and the Davenport and Muscatine interurban lines.

LONDON POLICE STRIKE

Labor Paper Claims 65,000 Officials Have Walked Out.

QUICK ACTION

LONDON, Aug. 1.—The police strike in London and the English provinces, called suddenly yesterday in protest against pending legislation affecting police organization, went into effect today.
