Ogden will be represented at the state fair in Salt Lake, according to R. C. Evans, executive secretary of the Ogden Livestock show which will be held here in January. The livestock show will have a booth at the fair and every effort will be made to induce the various cattlemen and sheepmen to enter their prize stock.

The Ogden show is attracting nationwide interest. In California in particular the show has been boosted and the Sacramento stock raisers have signified their intentions of entering choice cattle.

Several unique entertainment features will be arranged for the visitors including a dressed ball for the stockmen, a banquet and another feature which will be decided upon later.

A number of valuable trophies have been placed as prizes and the latest contributor to the list is E. L. Van Meter of the Ogden Savings bank. Mr. Van Meter has offered a special prize of \$50.

"The Ogden show will mean thou-

sands of dollars to the city, not only in advertising but in sales made during the visitors' stay here. With this fact in view the merchants of Ogden should get back of the movement and boost. The merchants are not taking the interest in the show that they should and this is hampering the show. The booster system should be adopted by each and every merchant and the show should be advertised from coast to coast.

"The livestock show here is the first in the history of the city, and as Ogden is just starting on a plan that will mean thousands of dollars to the city in future years the show should be put over with the view of a world's fair. Other cities of the country have had similar shows for the past twenty-five years and Ogden in entering the boosting idea for cattle will add increased interest to the business not only here but in other sections," said an official this morning.

### I. N. PIERCE MAY NOT BE ABLE TO HOLD HIS SEAT

SALT LAKE, Oct. 2.—Questions involving the right of certain members of the house of representatives to their seats in the legislature were further complicated after extended discussion yesterday when Representative C. G. Adney, presiding at the request of Speaker Heppner, declined to direct the chief clerk of the house to strike the names of Arthur Wellins and William O'Neil from the rolls. The acting speaker's action followed a vote of 13 to 15 favoring a motion proposed by Representative William W. Seemiller directing the speaker to have the chief clerk discontinue calling the names of the two men in question when roll calls were being taken. It was Mr. Adney's contention that depriving the two men of a right to vote constituted expulsion, and that such action required a two-thirds vote of the members.

Representative I. N. Pierce of Ogden involved himself in the eligibility question yesterday morning, announcing that, after consultation with the attorney general, he feared he was in the same position as Mr. Wellins and Mr. O'Neil. He asked to be excused from voting until the house credentials com-

mittee passed upon his case. Mr. Pierce said that, following the regular session, he was appointed a member of the inheritance tax commission by the district court of Weber county to examine into certain inheritance taxation matters, and in that position was on the state pay roll. According to the opinion rendered by the attorney general in the other two cases, this resulted in the automatic resignation of Mr. Pierce as a member of the legislature.

Representative O'Neil, on the floor of the house yesterday afternoon, bitterly

rebuked the members of the special investigating committee for the action it had taken, and the house for accepting the report of the committee. He declared that he did not believe he had violated his constitutional oath, and that he was entitled to his seat, and that he intended "to occupy his seat in the house until thrown out bodily." Mr. Wellins did not participate in the deliberations of the house at all yesterday, though he was on the floor for a time at the morning session.
