UNUSUAL FEATURES GOVERNMENT SALE OF FOODSTUFFS OF RED CROSS DRIVE CRITICIZED

In the drive which the Red Cross is to make for the next several weeks and which began today, some very unusual features will be on the program of events, among them being the living models whom Miss Carrie Knapp and Miss Lophelia Runyon of the art department of the city schools, have promised as their aid in the drive for membership. One department store each week will furnish their most attractive window for the models.

With no delivery of the goods ordered from the war department, considerable comment on the sale of government foodstuffs sale is prevalent about the city.

Attention to the fact that since the quotations on the army foodstuffs given here, and since the orders have been placed for the material, prices on several of the commodities in the local markets have fallen, thus making goods purchased here materially cheaper than the goods ordered from the war department.

It was commented upon by several that at the time of the government sale, bacon was quoted at 35c a pound. First class bacon is now being offered for sale in local markets for but thirty cents per pound, it is stated.

The same is said to be true in several other instances.

COLDS ARE BORN IN OVER HEATED ROOMS

Supt. Karl Hopkins of the Ogdan school systems, is in receipt of a letter from State Health Director E. G. Gowans in which Dr. Gowans urges that all students take every precaution against colds.

The letter follows: "The cold was born in an overheated, airtight room, where newly all colds have their origin. The germ very carefully selected the man who had invited it and prepared the way in his own body. The man nourished it and kept it alive by shutting out all the fresh air from his sleeping room at night and gave it prolonged life by feeding it on a patent medicine 'cold cure.' Really it was a wonderful time and place for the germ to begin its life. In the morning the man started for his place of business and not being the kind of man who has concern for the health and welfare of others, he was not careful to cover his mouth and nose with a handkerchief when coughing and sneezing." So as he went about he was a walking center for the distribution of disease and infection.

The common cold is not so serious in itself, but it is serious because of what it paves the way for—pneumonia, grippe, influenza, tuberculosis. It is contracted as a result of indoor exposure and can be prevented by spending

enough time in the open air and sleeping with the bedroom windows wide open. A sure prescription to give a man, woman, or child a "common cold" is: Get in a "draught" of food and shut out the fresh air. "The best treatment is prevention—right living which means plenty of fresh air day and night, proper food, bodily sensibly clothed, daily exercise, and the avoidance of overwork, overeating, late hours and constipation.

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CHILI TO SEND PROFESSORS TO CALIFORNIA U

BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 27.—Ratification by the government of Chile and the University of Chile of plans for the exchange of professors and instructors between the United States and the South American republic has been effected by the official decree of the Chilean government, according to recent advices to the University of California.

definite result of plans of the late Professor Henry Morse Stephens whereby the University of California was to become the center of exchanges of professors and students with the leading Hispanic countries of the world, and for the study of the history and contemporary problems of Spain and Portugal, and more particularly the Hispanic republics in the two continents of the Americas. Professor Stephens had also been instrumental in opening discussion with a view to a series of exchanges between the University of California and the National University of Mexico.

A committee of distinguished educators from the Chilean republic, headed by Dr. Don Pedro Aguirre, arrived in Berkeley early this year and proposed a series of permanent exchanges not only of professors of universities, but also of teachers of high schools and technical schools, including women as well as men. Senior Aguirre's committee further proposed to make use of the University of California as a clearing-house whereby the University should arrange for all exchanges in this country. Approval of the plan was announced by President Benjamin Ide Wheeler of the University of California and the regents of the university voted to accept it.

It is this arrangement which has become effective by the recent decree of President Sarruente of Chile. The exchanges are not to be limited to professors of the University of California or even teachers in the schools of the state. In each year there are to be not less than two or more than four exchange professors or instructors from each country, of whom one at the most is to exchange with a professor of the University of Chile, however, the exchange at the outset, will be limited to two from Chile and the United States respectively. While Professor Chapman of the University of California will be the first United States exchange professor, it is said the first exchange instructor will be E. M. Gregory of the San Francisco Polytechnic High School. His appointment, it is stated, would be peculiarly fitting because of his thorough knowl-

edge of Spanish and because of his relationship to a distinguished Spanish Californian family. His grandfather, William Hartnell, one of the distinguished men in California during Mexican era, resided in Chile prior to coming to Alta California in 1827. He was related by marriage to the famous De la Guerra family. Leave of absence has been granted to Professor Chapman as exchange professor from January 1920 to January, 1921.

To Be Reimbursed.

HANFORD, Cal., Oct. 27.—A telegram from Representative Edwin L. Davis of Tennessee, saying that W. O. Jenkins, American consular agent
