TWO AIR PATROLS FOR THE IDAHO FORESTS

With the prospective establishment of two air patrols in Idaho forests, over the two most hazardous portions of the forests, from a fire standpoint, considerable inquiry has been made at the local forestry offices concerning the establishment of air patrols in Utah and Nevada forests.

The establishments of air patrols in Utah is not anticipated, the fire menace in Utah forests being comparatively slight. Two fire patrols, each having three air craft, will be established in Idaho forests. Major Smith was recently in Boise, Idaho with a De Havilland plane overlooking prospective sites and the patrols will probably be established next spring. Sheridan Forced Out of Aerial Race at Owego

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Better flying weather today was promised the five aviators remaining in the army two-day transcontinental airplane race, although none of them apparently would be able to complete the 5492 mile flight. All the contestants were in the air yesterday for the first time in several days and added better distances than during any flying period since the unfavorable weather set in.

Lieutenant H. W. Sheridan suffered a keen disappointment when he was forced out of the race at Owego, N. Y., 163 miles from his goal after battling cold, snowstorms and winds nearly across the continent. His place in the van of the returning fliers and between Lieutenant Colonel M. E. Hartney and Lieutenant R. M. Bagby who took off from Chicago this morning. Lieutenant D. B. Gish spent the night at Des Moines, Iowa, and Captain F. Steine last in the race at Rawlins, Wyo.

Many Robberies Occur in City Of Salt Lake

SALT LAKE, Oct. 29.—Thieves in Salt Lake have robbed eleven stores in the downtown district and six homes in the residence district with success during the last three days, obtaining approximately \$4000 in money and goods. Nearly a score of lesser burglaries have been reported to the police from the residence district in the same period.

Main street, early yesterday morning and obtained \$640 in jewelry. Only the most valuable articles were taken by the robbers. A hole of the same dimensions and similar to that in the Anderson Jewelry company's window was found by the police in the window of the Salt Lake Loan office at 76 East Second South street yesterday morning. A pair of valuable field glasses and six revolvers were taken. On going upstairs last night at 7:30 o'clock, members of the family of M. L. Gordon, 274 South Twelfth East street, found that \$22 in currency had been taken from a dresser drawer. A purse containing \$7 owned by Miss Edith Austin, living in the Gordon home, was also missing. The thief gained entrance by scaling the porch to the second story Jewelry on dressers had been left un-

touched by the thief in his hurry to leave undetected. Plain-clothes-men F. B. Tripp and Walter Griffin investigated the case. By smashing a glass in the front door of the Desiring Sunday School Union book store, 44 East South Temple, yesterday morning, burglars gained entrance to the store and obtained \$2.75 in money, a brief case valued at \$12 and eighteen pocket knives. The lock on the Swyers Electric Supply store, 143 Tenth East street, was forced open yesterday, but the prowlers were evidently frightened away as nothing was taken. While returning from the downtown district last night at 8:30 o'clock, Dean Dinwoodey, of Idaho Falls, Idaho, a student at the University of Utah, who resides at 60 Gordon place, was held up by three robbers at the corner of Gordon place and Main street and robbed of \$25 and a gold watch. Covered with a revolver held in the hands of one of the bandit trio, Dinwoodey was forced to march into an alley near by for a distance of thirty feet, where he was locked in a garage. On leaving their victim in the garage, the robbers warned him not to leave the place, and then placed a chain over the door. Half an hour after being placed in the garage, Dinwoodey reported to the police, he heard someone lift the chain from its place, but, owing to the threats of the thieves, he did not venture to the door. Shortly after the owner of the garage opened the door and allowed him to go. No descrip-
