

EARLY END OF COAL STRIKE IN SIGHT UTAH MINES WORKING AT 90 PER CENT CAPACITY

Bolsheviki Claim Victory Over Russ Army

URGE PRESIDENTIAL COMMISSION TO ARBITRATE STRIKE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—A special presidential commission to attempt arbitration of the bituminous coal strike was proposed in a resolution introduced today by Chairman Kenyon, of the labor committee. Without discussion, the measure was referred to that committee.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 4.—Breaking his silence here for the first time since he was served with the restraining order from the court of Federal Judge A. B. Anderson last Friday, John L. Lewis, acting president of the United Mine Workers of America, gave out the following brief statement in regard to government efforts to end the strike of approximately 425,000 soft coal miners:

"The machinery of the joint system of bargain in the mining industry is intact. It would be a simple matter for the government and the coal operators again to set it in motion to negotiate a wage agreement."
