UTAH AGGIES WILL HAVE GLASSY TEAM

Coach Romney Has Many Hoop Stars Out For Varsity Five

LOGAN, Jan. 7.—Hoop practice at the Utah Agricultural college has started off with a bang and Coach Lowell Romney expects to have one of the best seasons in the history of the game. Scores of men have responded to the call for hoop candidates and the mentor will no doubt have a hard time in selecting his men.

Nine games have been scheduled in the Utah college circuit. Besides these games the collegians have scheduled games with the Montana schools and with other aggregations.

Coaches Elected.
Coach Romney is elated over the possibilities for a state title. Five letter men will be in the limelight besides a classy array of new men. The letter men are: Sunstog, Jarvis, McKay, Mohr and Andrus. Sid Spencer, old-time star, has also returned to school. Andrus is rated as one of the greatest guards in the United States, having won a position on the all-American team in 1917.

Besides the letter men the following are showing class galore in the practice games: Falck, Kirk, Sealey, Maughn, Hansen, Anderson, McDonald, Edwards, Murdoch, and Nagle.

Three Fresh Teams.
Freshies at the school will have three teams in harness this season. One aggregation will be represented in the northern high school division. Two other aggregations are entered in the Logan Commercial league.

Glen Dee and Lew Falck, former Ogdan high school stars, are expected to be the shining lights at the Aggie school in track this spring. Both men are in training for the big indoor meet at Salt Lake February 14. An indoor meet between the classes of the schools will be staged in the near future at which time a team will be selected to represent the Aggies at the State meet at Salt Lake. The following events will constitute the card: One hundred and 220-yard dashes, 440-yard run, 880-yard run, 1 mile run, 1 mile relay, 2 mile relay, high jump, broad jump, 100 and 50-yard swim events. A cross-country run with several Aggie stars is also scheduled.

BENNY LEONARD MAKES \$200,000

Lightweight Champion Checks in Large Amount of Coin in 1919

Two hundred thousand dollars! It's a lot of money in kopecks. With dollars as elusive as they are, it is hard to conceive of a man catching that many in the course of twelve months, especially when the man wears boxing gloves. Yet that is the approximate amount that Benny Leonard, the lightweight champion banked in 1919.

Leonard was the most active of all boxers, large or small, in this fertile land. He piled his trade with a diligence and vigor never before displayed by a champion in any class. He realized that the reign of a champion is not long at most and that a title holder has to "get it while the getting is good."

Twenty-five Bouts
Leonard engaged in twenty-five bouts during the year, an average of a contest almost every two weeks. This is exclusive of the several benefit bouts he boxed. According to his manager, Billy Gibson, the total gate receipts for those bouts amounted to approximately \$500,000. It Leonard drew down \$200,000 as his share then he averaged about 40 per cent of the gate receipts in each bout in which he took part. To attract a total of a half million dollars, the gate receipts for every bout averaged \$20,000 and Leonard received an average of \$8,000 for every time he entered the ring.

In eight of Leonard's principal bouts the gates totaled \$201,500, an average of \$25,187.50 per bout. The remaining sixteen bouts drew \$288,500, an average of \$17,531.25. His eight bouts during the year, where they were held and the gate receipts follow:

Fast Mat Men Are Matched For Semi-Final Go Thursday Evening

Two of the best middleweights in the west will vie for honors in the semi-final of the Harbertson-Santel championship wrestling match at the Alhambra theater Thursday evening when Art Chester, Idaho title holder, clashes with Ezra Peterson, the Utah champion.

Both Chester and Peterson have met on many occasions and the two men have always put up a nifty contest. In the contest tomorrow evening Chester will enter the ring a slight favorite over the Utah. He has held his title for more than ten years and has met and defeated some of the best bets in the world. A purse for \$200 has been posted for the match and it is expected that both boys will battle from the go. Police Gazette rules will reign. The bout will be best two in three falls with a two-hour limit.

Santel and Harbertson will both complete their training this evening. Santel wrestled all corners at the Eagles' gymnasium last night taking on nine men of various weights during the evening. His backers pronounce him in first class condition. Harbertson is also reported to be in tip top shape. Both men will weigh in at the Alhambra theater tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock.

New Type of Football Proves Drawing Card

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 7.—Out of the world war has emerged a type of football that has proved of greater drawing power than the sport of pre-war days. Such is the consensus of opinion of athletic directors of institutions comprising the Missouri Valley conference, who declare that football drew its largest crowds and created its greatest interest during the 1919 season.

Crowds ranging from 5,000 to 6,000 persons witnessed the majority of games, athletic directors reported. Six thousand persons saw the Kansas Aggie-Iowa Aggie contest at Ames, Iowa. More than 5,000 people were banded on the sidelines at Columbia, Mo., when the Tigers met Nebraska. The Kansas Aggies played to 22,000 spectators during the season.

A considerable bulge in football receipts for 1919 over those of other years is noted, but it is pointed out that increased expenses of the game this year cut a wide swath in receipts. The high cost of football has made its advent, directors said.

TIJUANA WILL GET CARPENTIER-DEMPESEY CHAMPIONSHIP FIGHT

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 7.—"Tijuana, Mexico, will get the Dempsey-Carpentier fight," said Jack Kearns, manager for the world's champion, when advised today by the Associated Press of Georges Carpentier's conditional acceptance of Promoter Coffroth's offer.

Kearns said he would prepare a further statement within a few hours.

\$400,000 Purse Offered.
PARIS, Jan. 7.—Georges Carpentier and Jack Dempsey will probably meet in America for the championship of the world as a result of the acceptance last night by Descamps, manager for Carpentier, of an offer of a \$400,000 purse for the bout by James Coffroth, Dempsey's manager. Coffroth has already accepted Coffroth's terms and all that remains to insure the meeting of the two pugilists is the settlement of the number of rounds the men will fight and the division of the purse.

Coffroth's offer was for a bout going 45 rounds, but objection to a fight of this length is expressed in the Carpentier camp. Carpentier would rather have the fight limited to fifteen rounds or even ten. Descamps declared last night that if the issue is not settled in less than fifteen rounds "neither Dempsey nor Carpentier is worthy to be champion of the world."

It was indicated Descamps would ask for an even break of the purse, holding Carpentier was as pure a drawing card as Dempsey.
