CIGARMAKERS ISSUE A STATEMENT UPON STRIKE HERE

In connection with the strike of union cigarmakers, the local today issued the following statement: "In answer to the statement of manufacturers cigarmakers' Local No. 307 of Ogden makes the following statement: 'The manufacturers' statement in regard to a 33 1/3 per cent increase is entirely wrong except in one isolated case. The general increase which would benefit the cigarmakers amounts to 20 per cent and less. To a disinterested party this statement would lead one to believe the manufacturers were being imposed on. If a manufacturer can incorporate his business and guarantee prospective buyers 20 or 30 per cent on their investment it looks reasonable they can stand the raise that is asked for.'"
