**SPRINGFIELD, Mass. Feb. 12.**—Joe Stecher of Nebraska, world's champion catch-as-catch-can wrestler, defeated Jack Dwyer of Michigan here in two straight falls. The first fall came in 49 minutes, 40 seconds and the second in 15 minutes, both with a body scissors and armlock.

**TOLEDO, Ohio, Feb. 12.**—March twelfth was the date set for the 12 round no decision bout between Jimmy Wilde and Frankie Mason, at a meeting of the Toledo boxing commission today. ### MORE STOLEN GOODS FOUND AT HOME OF PRISONER

After Lee Jordan, who stole a quantity of goods from the Ogden Wholesale Drug company had served a term of four months in the county jail and had left this part of the country, the recovery of more loot has been reported.

Safety razor blades valued at \$80 and clinical thermometers, valued at \$15, were found during Tuesday and Wednesday of this week at the former home of Jordan, 2144 Quincy avenue.

Two employees of the Ogden Wholesale Drug company located the safety razor blades hidden under the flooring on the second floor of the house. The goods were returned to the company, and on the following day two boys who had been playing around the vacant house found clinical thermometers under the coal shed.

Charles Empey, general manager of the drug company, said the articles recovered this week, which were stolen by Jordan do not amount to anything considering the quantity of goods which was removed by him since 1916.

Thus far, efforts to locate the large cache which Jordan is thought to have made, have been without avail. Mr. Empey stated that though the goods which were stolen were of considerable value, the cost of finding them would probably put the company to more expense than the articles are worth.
