WOMEN VOTERS FOR EDUCATIONAL BILL

Adopt Resolutions Recommending Passage of Pending Legislation

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—The National League of Women Voters today adopted resolutions recommending the passage of pending legislation which provides for the expenditure of \$100,000,000 for education. This money is to be divided among the states.

Two bills endorsed are the Smith-Towner bill, the Kenyon bill and House bill on naturalization. The women of the league also ask for an educational qualification for the vote in all states after all not qualified have had ample opportunity to make good their lack of training.

Compulsory education, nine months of the year, between the ages of 6 and 16 is recommended. Thorough provision for the education of newcomers and all others, who have not yet been absorbed into American citizenship by education and training are asked.

The report of the committee on the unification of laws concerning the legal status of women, Catherine Waugh McCulloch, Chicago, chairman, asks for independent citizenship for married women.

Two of the recommendations by this committee which evoked great enthusiasm in the meeting were one which urges that the minimum age of consent in all states be made 18 years and another which asks that women of the league refrain from using their connection with that organization to assist any political party.

Just civil service laws and mother's pensions in all states were also recommended.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Feb. 18.—The rejection of the federal woman suffrage amendment by the house of delegates was made certain today when a ratification resolution was defeated 36 to 64. This resolution was offered as a substitute to the resolution rejecting the amendment, favorably reported by the committee on federal relations, which will be acted upon later today.

BLIZZARD STOPS THE TRIAL OF NEWBERRY

Witness Stormbound, Handicapped by Flu Epidemic—Telegrams Read

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Feb. 18.—The Newberry election conspiracy trial today was stormbound and handicapped by the influenza epidemic today. So many witnesses were delayed in reaching this city by a blizzard or held at home by sickness that the prosecution was forced to rely almost wholly upon documentary evidence. More than a hundred campaign telegrams were read to the jury and the proceedings dragged until Senator Newberry fell fast asleep in his chair.

The one bit of new testimony came from Kenneth O. Throckmorton, a Grand Rapids youth who swore that William E. Rice, one of the local defendants, had him circulate nominating petitions for James W. Helme at the Great Lakes naval training station. Helme was the rival of Henry Ford in the Democratic primaries of 1918 and is the man whom the defense acknowledged in its opening statement was "worked" into the race.

CALIFORNIA RANGES TOO DRY FOR CATTLE

Protracted Draught May Force Stockmen to Ship Arizona Texas and New Mexico For Feeding

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18.—If present conditions in California continue throughout this year, between 150,000 and 500,000 head of cattle will have to be shipped to ranges elsewhere, according to a statement today by D. J. Stollery, secretary of the California Cattlemen's association. The cattle go mainly to Texas but also to Arizona and New Mexico, he said.

Mr. Stollery declared that shipments from northern California ranges would have to be made within 30 days unless rain fell before that time, and that shipments would have to be made from southern California unless rain fell within 60 days. He said it would be impossible to predict at this time the size of these shipments.

Many cattle men already have arranged with railroad companies to handle shipments of stock, should continued drought make it necessary, he said.

Strict Economy Necessary.
Strict economy must be practiced in concert by water and power users in California this season to avert disaster resulting from the water shortage following a succession of three dry years, state railroad commission engineers declared today in a conference held to discuss the situation. The San Joaquin light and power company is the concern most seriously affected at present, as its power load must be cut in half at the end of ten days unless rain comes, according to L. S. Ready, assistant engineer for the commission.

Situation is Acute.
C. H. Lee, state water commissioner, reported that the situation in the Sacramento valley is acute, and asserted that the planting of rice must be lessened if a shortage was to be avoided. The water commission had limited diversions, he said, and put checks on the use of water that it hoped would enable irrigators to go through the year without a shortage of crops. He advised, however, the planting of crops that would mature early and thus cut down the demand for water in the late summer.

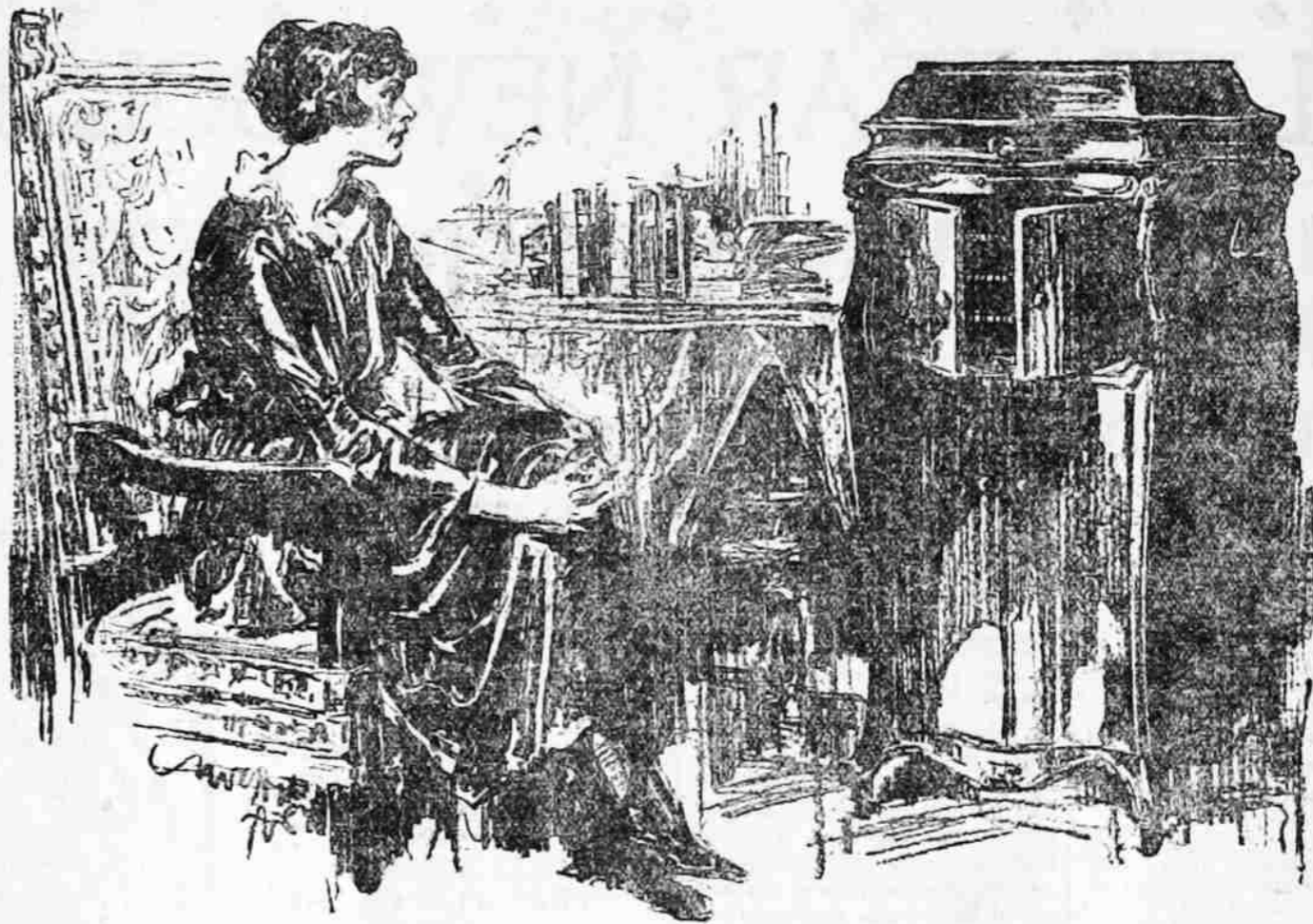
