South American Cables Broken by Earthquake. WASHINGTON, March 3.—Two earthquakes occurred in the South Pacific ocean last Saturday, resulting in the breaking of both South American cables, according to information received here today. Further details are lacking. Seismographic records at Georgetown university disclosed that both shocks were recorded there, the first, which was of considerable intensity, at 1:50 p. m., Saturday, and the second at 6:48 p. m. The first continued until 2:25 p. m. The centers of the disturbances were estimated at about 3800 miles from Washington.

Government Assures Gold Star Fathers Salary Increases for Teachers are Proposed. WASHINGTON, March 4.—Assurance that the government will pay all expenses, incident to the return of American soldier dead from Europe, was given by Secretary Baker today to a committee of Gold Star Fathers. The war department bears all expenses of transportation from Europe to the home of next of kin, Mr. Baker explained, and the war risk bureau is authorized to pay funeral expenses up to \$100 in each case. Purchase of cemetery lots is included in the funeral expenses.

Belgians Vote in Favor of Woman Suffrage. LONDON, March 4.—The Belgian chamber has voted in favor of votes for women. 21 years of age as well as men in communal elections, says the Brussels correspondent of the London Times. All the Catholic members voted for the measure and all the liberals, except Paul Hyman, minister of foreign affairs, and Burgomaster May against it, while the socialists were divided between their general principle of equality and fear of religious influence. The liberals considered that women are not yet ready for the vote. An amendment offered by Burgomaster May, excluding women of "notorious misconduct" was adopted. In view of the fact that voting at elections is compulsory, the presence of only one woman in the public gallery during the debate would seem to indicate how little interest the women take in the question.

Medical Graduates Not Taught Preventives. CHICAGO, March 4.—The sanitary engineer is better fitted in the study of disease preventive than are graduates of medical colleges, Dr. Victor E. Vaughan, dean of medicine in the University of Michigan, declared before the congress on medical education. "Graduates of our medical schools today are not in any way fitted to do public health work," Dr. Vaughan said. "The science of preventive medicine is not taught in our universities. The whole trend of the teaching is toward curative methods."

I. W. W. TRY TO PROVE DARK CONSPIRACY. Six Witnesses Brought Into Court but Judge Decides Evidence Not Admissable. MONTESANO, Wash., March 4.—Counsel for ten Industrial Workers of the World on trial here on a charge of murder in connection with the Armistice Day shooting at Centralia, Wash., called six witnesses to the stand in an effort to prove a conspiracy to run the I. W. W. out of Centralia but none was permitted to testify. The court ruled that before such evidence would be admissible defense must prove that Warren O. Grimm, with whose murder the defendants are specifically charged, was a party to the alleged conspiracy. This, the court held, had not yet been established.

Charges Against Wilson Nominee to Be Probed. WASHINGTON, March 3.—Investigation will be made by the senate foreign relations committee of charges that George W. P. Hunt, of Arizona, nominated by President Wilson for minister to Siam, had publicly declared his sympathy with the I. W. W. before action is taken on the appointment. The committee so decided today but deferred until Friday any decision on detailed plans for hearing the case.

CHICAGO, March 4.—Southern laborers who are "eating too high up on the hog" and American housewives who "eat too far back on the beef" are to blame for the continued high cost of living, the American Institute of Meat Packers announced. With the export market for meat shattered by adverse foreign exchange and wholesale prices back to where they were a year and two years ago, the American consumer is chiefly responsible, the institute's bulletin on February conditions says.
