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POPULATION OF OGDEN. Mayor Francis says the census will give Ogden a population of 32,700.

Washington's population is given as 437,414, a gain of 106,345, or 22.1 per cent over the previous census.

Incidentally the time taken by the census bureau to begin giving out reports on population discloses that the ten years elapsing since the last census has seen improvements in the processes of enumeration.

UTAH TOMATO PRICES LESS THAN EASTERN AVERAGES

A bulletin issued by the bureau of crop estimates, United States department of agriculture, shows that the average price per ton paid to growers by canners of Utah for tomatoes grown on contract in 1919 was \$14.71.

Utah canners put an average of 19.9 cases of No. 3 cans of tomatoes in 1919 as compared with an average for the nation of 20.3 cases.
