

GET FUND FOR SCHOOL WORK

Director of Americanization Reports Ogdan District to Receive \$847

An appropriation of \$847 has been awarded Ogdan to carry on Americanization work, the funds coming from the state board of education, it was announced yesterday. Arch H. Thurman, director of Americanization in the schools of Utah, reported a fund of \$8,000 on hand for the Americanization work in the state, which he had apportioned to seven districts on the basis of expenditures in the districts for the class of work.

This was determined yesterday by the state board of education, which held its meeting in the Capitol and appointed a committee of three to draft a resolution to this effect to be presented at an adjourned meeting of the board scheduled for tonight.

The committee consisted of John A. Widtsao, president of the University of Utah; George A. Eaton, principal of the East High school, and D. C. Jensen, superintendent of the Jordan school district.

The action, taken on the motion of Dr. Widtsao, was couched in the following resolution: That in accordance with established precedent and policy in Utah, this board declare itself in favor of non-partisanship in the matter of selecting the state superintendent of public instruction, and to the end a committee of three from the board be appointed to draft a resolution to be addressed to the various political parties in the state in conformity with this action, and to report to the board at 3 p. m. Thursday.

ROAD FUND FOR WEBER \$44,000

Disbursements During June Is Revealed in Report of State Auditor

ESSEX KEEPING UP STIFF GRIND

Automobile Drives Throughout Night and Day in Endurance Run

The green Essex car passing through Ogdan at regular intervals all night and today, hasn't missed an explosion since it started yesterday and is still going strong. This car is not out for a speed test, but is being put through a 24-hour endurance run by W. A. Rose, C. H. Jacobson and G. C. Cook, all of the Ogdan Motor Car company. This test is being made in connection with the National Essex week, which is being observed by Essex dealers throughout the country.

This particular car has been running through Layton, Ogdan and Brigham city since 3 p. m. yesterday, and has stopped only to take on passengers and for gas and oil. There have been no delays due to troubles of any kind.

When planning the trip the men expected to average between 20 and 25 miles an hour for the entire 24 hours to be traveled.

An accurate check is being made of gasoline used and miles observed.

Tests of this kind are not new to the Essex for an Essex holds the world's 24-hour record for distance traveled, having covered 1081 miles in that time over dirt roads. An Essex also holds the world's 50-hour endurance record, as well as innumerable local records in all parts of the country, and for hill climbing and speed.

The Essex being put through the 24-hour grind by the local company is the same car that made two trips to Bear Lake and return the first part of this week. On the first of these trips the morning edition of the Standard-Examiner carried subscribers in the cities visited with a slip pasted to each copy telling how the early delivery of their paper was possible by means of the speedy Essex.

The second of these trips was made Tuesday morning in a rainstorm which had made all the roads through the canyons extremely treacherous. The Essex, however, plowed right through without the slightest trouble, helping many other less powerful cars along the way, making the round trip to Bear Lake in 9 1/4 hours.

BOY RUN OVER BY AUTOMOBILE

Injured Lad Walks Home Where He Is Taken With Convulsions

Royal Chapple, 5 years old, the son of Joseph and Mrs. Esther Clark Chapple, was injured yesterday when an automobile, driven by two young men and four girls, knocked him to the pavement and passed over his body. The boy sustained a severe gash on his head but had strength enough to run to his home, 533 Thirtieth nearly half a block from the scene of the accident at Washington avenue and Thirtieth street.

Immediately following his arrival at his home, the boy was taken with convulsions and was immediately rushed to the Dee hospital. His condition is reported serious.

Witnesses claim that the boy was watching excavation work which was going on and was sitting on the edge of the curb. The machine was approaching slowly and the boy arose and took about three steps to the street directly in the path of the machine, which he apparently did not see.

The car stopped but before the youngster could be picked up, he had run to his mother. The car followed, and notwithstanding the fact that it was in the vicinity for fully fifteen minutes, none of the spectators obtained the license number nor the names of the car's occupants.

Search was made last night by the police and sheriff's department but no information which would lead to the identity of the car's occupants was determined. Because the driver and the rest of the party apparently acted in good faith, stopping their machine and doing what they could to express sympathy over the accident, the police believe they will reveal their identity.
