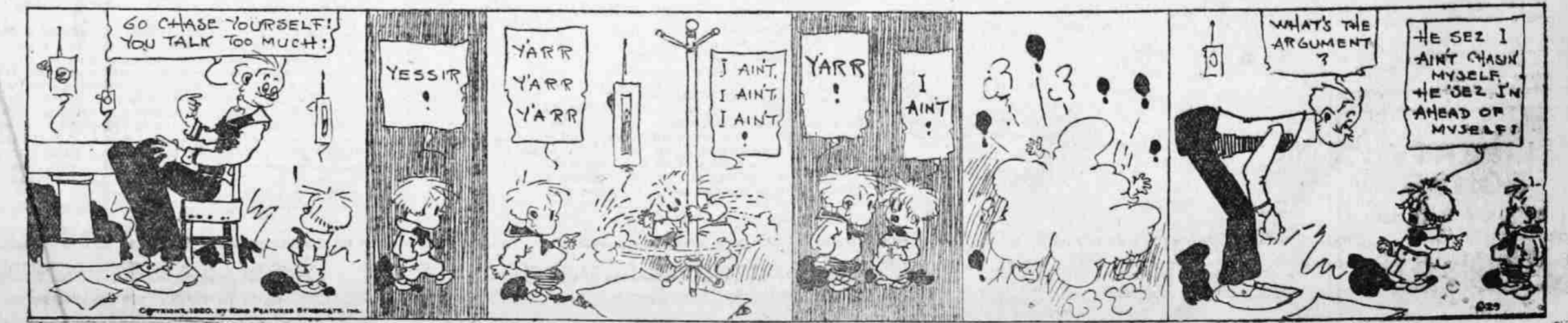
POOR TIGERS
