MAN KILLED IN FAMILY FIGHT

Woman's Divorced Husband Slays Present Mate at Barber, Idaho

Boise, Ida., July 2.—Arthur Pressley of Barber is being held in the Ada county jail charged with murder for the alleged shooting of J. C. Christie, Opie, 25, of Meridian, last Wednesday night. Following the shooting Opie was rushed to the St. Athanasius hospital, but died a short time after arrival.

A short time ago Opie married the divorced wife of Pressley and family troubles are said to have caused the tragedy. Tuesday Opie and his wife moved to Barber to see Pressley, but he avoided them. It is declared, Wednesday they went again, meeting Pressley as he came from work at 11 p. m. It is alleged that Opie attacked Pressley, who fired, the bullet penetrating Opie's right side. Pressley's age is said to be 40.

CHILD RETIRES AS EDUCATIONAL HEAD

SALT LAKE, July 2.—George N. Child retired yesterday from the position of state superintendent of public instruction, took office as superintendent of Salt Lake City schools. He was succeeded by J. L. Muir in the state position. Dr. Ernest A. Smith who leaves the Salt Lake superintendency to become head of schools at Evanston, Ill., will remain in Salt Lake until after the National Educational association convention.

Other changes in the personnel of the city superintendents' office yesterday were assumption of the duties of assistant superintendent by J. T. Woolton and George A. Eaton. Mr. Eaton, who was formerly superintendent of schools for the Granite school district, will have special supervision over the grade school work. Mr. Eaton, who was East High school principal, will have supervision over high school work.

Oscar Van Cott, former assistant superintendent of schools, will serve as principal of the Bryant Junior High school. J. H. Coumbs will replace Mr. Eaton as principal of the East High school.

NEW EDIFICE PLANNED BY POCATELLO CHURCH

POCATELLO, Ida., July 2.—Erection of one of the largest churches of the city is being planned by Presbytery of Pocatello. Decision to build was made at a meeting of the congregation of the First Presbyterian church, which met with the board of governors last night.

The church edifice will be at East Lewis and S. Seventh avenue and will cost, exclusive of organ, heating and furniture, approximately \$75,000. Total cost will be above \$100,000.

Preliminary plans show a structure of exceptional beauty and dignity. Those who spoke last night in favor of the new church building were S. E. Brady, E. C. White, Joe T. Young, F. C. McGowan, the Rev. C. J. Phelps, Mr. E. C. White and C. W. Gray. Building operations are to start immediately.

EVANSTON WILL HONOR HEROES

Monument to Soldiers to Be Unfurled at Independence Day Celebration

EVANSTON, Wyo., July 2.—Service men of Utah county will be honored at a gala celebration here July 5 when the entire county unites to make the celebration a success.

One of the features of the day will be the unveiling of a monument recently erected under the auspices of the Utah County Memorial association. It is a beautiful conception of the American "doughboy," interpreted in Vermont granite and one of the first to be completed in the west.

The program consists of a morning salute, sports, a monster parade, races and contests of various nature.

Rancher Captures Lynx on Promontory

BRIGHAM CITY, July 2.—Lewis Whitaker, a rancher on the Promontory, was exhibiting a pair of two-month-old lynx cubs in Brigham City Wednesday. The cubs were captured by Mr. Whitaker on Promontory mountain a few days ago, after he had killed their mother with a rock. The little cubs retreated to the farthest corner of a rock cave following the death of their protector, and Mr. Whitaker secured them with a wire snare, which he dropped over their heads, one at a time, and hauled them out. Mr. Whitaker said that he proposed to either send the cubs to the Salt Lake zoo or sell them to a moving picture producing company.

POCATELLO, Ida., July 2.—Major C. M. Booth presided as toastmaster at the banquet for ex-service men held last night with Pocatello Legionnaires as hosts.

M. J. Sulley of Twin Falls, chief speaker of the evening, attacked the work of the "doughboys" in war with their duties in times of peace. He called upon them to respond to the government's call to protect the government from subversive forces working against it and rapped the I. W. W. and Bolshevik movement in no uncertain words.

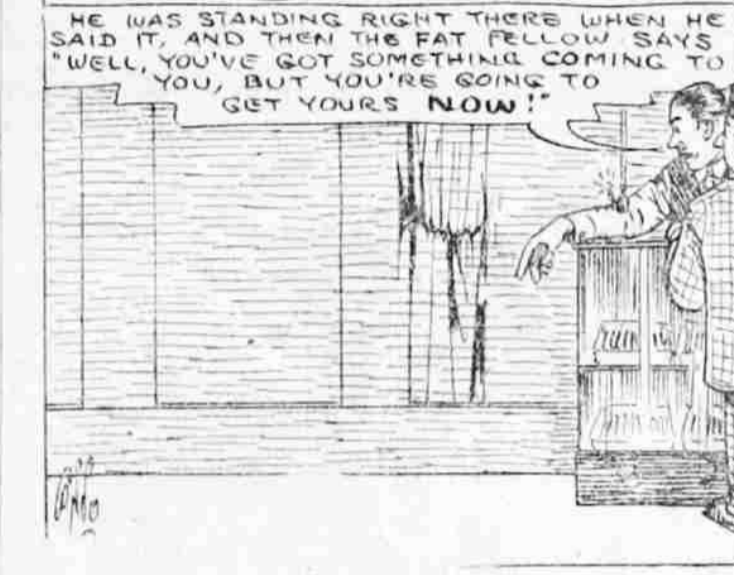
THREE APPEAR BEFORE STATE DENTAL BOARD

Utah Cadets Will Visit Pacific Fleet

CAMP KEARNY, Cal., July 2.—It has been announced that during their stay at the summer camp, the cadets of the Junior U. S. C. unit are to be accorded the privilege of visiting and inspecting the Pacific fleet. The United States said Admiral Benson, "is in earnest in its efforts to place within the ownership of United States citizens the control of at least a part of its traffic in imports and exports. BENSON WARNS FOREIGN FIRMS TO STAND BACK

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Warning foreign interests not to attempt to interfere with development of the American merchant marine, Chairman Benson of the shipping board declared today that the board was determined to build up an American merchant marine as contemplated by the Jones shipping act, despite threats and propaganda to defeat the law.

Foreign carriers and those in the United States interested more in the foreign than American institutions will do well to sleep peacefully. Benson's warning was issued in a talk to representatives of Pacific coast chambers of commerce and trade bodies and American railway representatives which have been disturbed by threats to divert trade to points on the Pacific coast because of the section of the merchant marine act permitting a preferential rate over foreign carriers within the United States on merchandise moving in export and import in American vessels.

THRESH OUT PLANS FOR CACHE VALLEY ROADS

SALT LAKE, July 2.—In an animated session held yesterday between the Cache valley board of commissioners and members of the state road commission, it was suggested that in order to carry out as much work as possible in the course of the Wellsville canyon road, which is estimated to cost \$10,000, be eliminated, the bridges at Blacksmith's Fork and Muddy creek, the latter of which would cost \$14,975 more, and all maintenance cost be omitted this year from the state road fund, but maintenance be provided for by the county from some other source or fund.

Formal Denials Made of Rypins Statement

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Formal denials were made today by the state and war departments of the statement of Professor Stanley I. AMERICANS TO JOIN TRAVELING PEACE COUNCIL

BRUSSELS, July 1.—The United States will be represented informally tomorrow at the meeting of the traveling peace conference which, after having met in three other countries most affected by the war, will assemble here. W. C. Boyler of Chicago and Colonel James A. Logan, the American unofficial members, will come with the reparations commission, which will sit at the same time as the supreme council.

TURKS IN GREAT EXULTATION OVER ALLEGED VICTORY

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 1.—There is great exultation among the Turks here because of the alleged victory of the Nationalists over the Greeks in the vicinity of Pergamum, where Mustafa Kemal Pasha's forces are reported to have outflanked the Greeks and to be moving northwards toward Panderma, taking several thousand prisoners.

Many Wounded in Lubeck Food Riots

BERLIN, June 30.—Two policemen were wounded and many persons were injured today in food riots at Lubeck, where, after compelling vegetable and fruit merchants to reduce their prices, disorderly crowds marched through the streets, plundering shops and firing on the police.
