

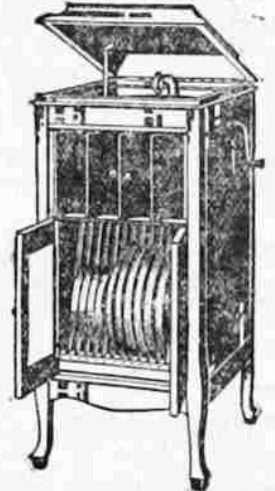

Creed Haymond Thinks Paddock Will Cop Century Race at Antwerp

Creed Haymond, national 100 and 220 yard college champion in 1919, a member of the Ogdén A. A. track aggregation, returned to Ogdén yesterday from Los Angeles. Haymond tore a muscle in the trials for the western team at Pasadena staged last Saturday, but due to his record in past events was chosen as a member of the western team to compete in the finals. Clinton Larson high jumper and Alma Richards all-around star, will also enter the finals under the colors of the local club.

Charlie Paddock is one of the world's greatest runners, according to Haymond, and is likely to cop the 100 yard dash at Antwerp.

"I look for Paddock to cop the century in the finals and believe that the west will have four sprinters on the team that departs from New York this month," said Haymond.

NON-PARTISANS IN NORTH DAKOTA IN LEAD AT PRIMARIES

FARGO, N. D., July 2.—With the gubernatorial contest virtually conceded a non-partisan victory, interest in Wednesday's primary election turned today to the contest for the United States senatorial nomination on the Republican ticket.

The early lead established by Senator A. J. Gronna was dwindling somewhat at noon, his total of 738 out of 2964 precincts in the state being 29,823 as against the 18,724 polled by Dr. E. F. Ladd, the league candidate.

Predictions today by the Fargo Forum, which has supported the candidacy of William Langer for governor, placed the estimated majority of Governor Lynn J. Frazier, the league choice, at from 5,000 to 7,500. Langer had a lead of 1,602 votes in 1,522 precincts, but the missing precincts were recognized as Frazier strongholds almost entirely.

20,000 TRAVEL THROUGH OGDEN IN PAST MONTH

Despite the fact that the Shriners' convention at Portland ended some time ago and the Democratic delegates are safe at San Francisco, traffic on the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific continues to be unusually heavy, according to officials of the two roads.

Thirteen cars, including one diner and one baggage car departed on No. 19 this morning for San Francisco with more than 200 passengers aboard. During the period of travel of delegates to the convention at San Francisco fourteen cars was the limit on the trains.

W. G. Wilson, special agent for the Southern Pacific lines, stated today that traffic over the Southern Pacific lines out of Ogdén had shattered all records for the month of June. Wilson said: "As far as I can determine, the June records as far back as 1910 have been shattered. While the records have not been completed as yet more than 20,000 passengers were handled on our lines out of Ogdén in June, which in itself is some record."
