MORE CHARGES IN MATEWAN CASE

Indictments Alleging Bribery Returned by Grand Jury After Investigation

WILLIAMSON, W. Va., July 5.—Additional indictments were returned last night by the special grand jury investigating the battle between citizens and authorities and Baldwin-Feltle detectives at Matewan, W. Va., May 19, in which ten persons were killed. Indictments charging bribery were returned against R. C. Willis, Williamson attorney, W. A. Williams and J. M. Tulley. It is charged the men offered bribes to Deputy Sheriff J. P. Webb and back to Dave Phillips to resign their positions. Deputy Sheriff Webb was indicted on a charge of accepting a bribe to cause Ezra Fry, who is said to be a union organizer, to be removed from the county. Fry was indicted on seven counts for murder. The grand jury completed its work and was discharged. Previously it had returned seven indictments charging murder in each case against 25 persons, including "Sid" Hatfield, chief of police at Matewan. Six Baldwin-Feltle detectives were indicted jointly on two counts for the killing of Mayor C. C. Testerman of Matewan and Otto Kingsley, a small boy. A score of misdemeanor indictments for unlawful eviction of miners from their homes and for carrying concealed weapons were returned.

AUDITORIUM, SAN FRANCISCO, July 5.—On the thirtieth ballot McAdoo overcame the Cox lead and sprang back to first place by gradual accessions which followed a slide from Indiana and Washington. The standing: McAdoo 403 1/2; Cox 400 1/2; Palmer 166; Davis 58. The changes in the thirtieth ballot showed that McAdoo gained 9; Cox lost 4; Palmer lost 1, and Davis lost 5. John Mooney, chairman of the conference, charged that an army of occupation was trying to break down their lines and that on their flank the British trade unionists, under the guise of friendship were holding to feed the furnaces for their destruction.
