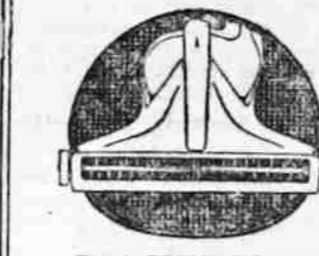

Milk Consumed Here Tests Satisfactorily

That milk consumed in Ogdien is rapidly improving due to the activities of the city and state food departments in making frequent tests from samples taken from dairies, is made evident in a report received this morning from Walter M. Boyden, state food inspector by John Felt, city milk inspector. The report shows that twelve samples were tested and but three failed to pass the required mark. These fell below standard in food solids and the other slightly dirty.
