

HARDING URGES AID FOR SUFFRAGE

Republicans in Tennessee Legislature Are Asked for Favorable Vote

MARION, O., Aug. 5.—Further influence for ratification of the women's suffrage amendment by the Tennessee legislature was exerted today by Senator Harding in telegrams and suffrage leaders at Nashville.

To State Senator John C. Houck, chairman of the Republican state committee, the nominee wired as follows: SENDS OUT MESSAGES

"With the approach of a decision by the general assembly of Tennessee on the matter of ratifying the suffrage amendment to the federal constitution, I would like to be advised as to poll to Republican members, I cling to the belief that the Tennessee Republicans are in a position to serve both party and country by effecting ratification. Will welcome advice as to whether I can aid in securing this act of justice to the women citizenship of our nation."

He also sent a telegram of encouragement to Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National Woman Suffrage association, in response to a joint appeal for help from her and Mrs. George Fort Milton, president of the Tennessee League of Women Voters. The message to Mrs. Catt follows:

"Your telegram received. No discouragement is voiced from here. On the contrary we are continuing to encourage the Republicans of the Tennessee general assembly to join cordially in the effort to consummate ratification."

VISITS CIVIL WAR VETERANS Correspondence and more political conference occupied Senator Harding most of today although he set aside time in the afternoon to receive a delegation from Ohio State university and to visit as a guest of honor the reunion here of civil war veterans of the old Fourth Ohio infantry.

Senator Watson, of Indiana, who came to Marion yesterday to see the nominee, issued a statement today declaring that George White's selection as Democratic national chairman had helped cement President Wilson's hold on the Democratic nominee.

"Mr. White himself is a Princeton graduate," said the statement. "I have often talked with him about the president, his admiration for whom he has made no secret. Mr. White's selection was no compromise at all, because President Wilson wins at all points."

SECRET TREATY WHICH BETRAYS POLAND, BARED LONDON, Aug. 5.—Soviet Russia concluded a secret treaty with Germany concerning Poland a few weeks before the great Polish offensive began, says a correspondent of the London Times. He claims he has secured the information from "excellent authority."

The treaty, it is asserted, contained the following provisions: Russian, without interference from Germany, would be allowed to appropriate all of Poland's arms, munitions, rolling stock and foodstuffs.

Russia would then undertake to completely evacuate Poland in favor of Germany which would hold the country as a guarantee against future credits to Russia in return for German goods and German labor.

"Russia," the correspondent adds, "intends to try to avoid the terms of this treaty by the creation of a Polish Bolshevik army. The Bolsheviks will wage their next campaign against Rumania in Bessarabia."

CHILDREN LEAVE FOR RUSS HOME

San Francisco Says Goodbye to 782 Refugee Youths From the Orient

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—The second lap of the long sea journey from Siberia to Petrograd was undertaken today by 782 refugee Russian children when the Japanese liner Yomei Maru, chartered by the American Red Cross and designated as the "Children's ark," weighed anchor in San Francisco bay and steamed for the Russian capital.

The children arrived here Monday and were the guests of the city and the Red Cross chapters for three days. They obtained their first concrete impressions of America on sight-seeing trips, in the city parks and playgrounds. Gifts of toys, fruit and candy were showered upon them during their stay.

The children, several of them who were said to be offspring of nobility, became separated from their parents early in the world war. They were sent into interior Russia during the several revolutionary movements. At the end of the war it was found impossible to return them overland to Petrograd because of the collapse of Russian transportation and unsettled conditions in that country. The Red Cross assembled them at Vladivostok from many points and chartered the Yomei Maru to carry them home by sea. The ship will stop at New York.

H. C. L. PICKETS AT ENTRANCE TO STORES IN BERLIN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Picketing against unnecessary buying was developed in Berlin in an effort to reduce the high cost of living, according to a report from the American commission in Germany to the department of commerce.

Attempts are being made to discourage purchasers until prices fall. A slight fall in prices has stopped buying rather than stimulating it, the report stated, as purchasers are waiting further reductions.

Salesmen in the large stores, the report continued, say visitors with pencil and paper make the rounds, figure and write down prices and leave without buying, announcing they would wait for further reductions.

High prices in all lines of business, according to the report, are responsible for widespread unemployment in Berlin, the latest official figures showing 25,998 persons without work in the city, of whom 23,305 were men and 2,623 women.

'PRESS MOVES THE WORLD' SAYS Y S BROOKLYN JUDGE

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—The press "is the lever that moves the world as no other earthly power could move it," said Supreme Justice Pawcett in Brooklyn today, when he continued the preliminary injunction granted in favor of a Brooklyn newspaper, restraining Mayor Hylan from banning a representative of the paper with whom he had a difference, from the board of estimates chamber.

"The press should not be hampered while in the lawful pursuit of gathering news, or interference while honestly disseminating really important information for its readers," the justice ruled.

OREGON CENSUS SHOWS 783,285

State's Numerical Increase Is 110,520 Persons in Last Ten Years

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Oregon has a population of 783,285, an increase of 16.4 per cent in the last ten years, the census bureau announced today. The state's increase was not so large numerically as in the decade ending with 1910, but it was larger than that for the decade ending with 1900. The increase in numbers was 110,520, the third largest numerical increase in the state's history.

Oregon's rate of increase is larger than that of Georgia or Delaware, the only two other states whose 1910 census has been announced. Georgia's increase was 10.9 per cent and Delaware's 10.2 per cent.

Oregon ranked as 35th state in point of population in 1910 with 672,765 people. Organized as a territory in 1848 its first federal census in 1850, showed a population of 13,294. In the earlier years, the percentage from 1850 to 1860 having been 294.7, while in the decade ending with 1910 it was 62.7 per cent.

TRACES FOUND OF PREHISTORIC PEOPLE IN SPAIN

MADRID, Aug. 4.—Important discoveries of neolithic arms, urns and utensils have been reported from Jumilla, near Valencia where a storehouse of prehistoric remains was found late last year. Further excavations conducted under the auspices of the academy of history, proved that the discovery was one of a far-reaching nature, comprising stone knives, admirably ornamented hatchets, and other instruments. Bones of early inhabitants were also found.

AIR MAIL PLANE LEAVES SALT LAKE FOR RENO

SALT LAKE, Aug. 5.—The leading plane of the all-metal squadron flying from New York to San Francisco to map aerial mail routes, left here at 7:30 a. m. for Reno.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Aug. 5.—Repaired to a leaky radiator and a punctured tire on the second mail plane of the New York to San Francisco route were complete and Pilot S. C. Eaton left here for Salt Lake City at 9:40 o'clock this morning.

WILL ERECT MONUMENT TO 'PILGRIM MOTHERS'

BOSTON, Mass.—The Pilgrim Mothers are to be honored with a monument at Provincetown, Mass., near that which marks the landing of the Pilgrims. The memorial to the women who came over in the Mayflower will cost \$350,000, of which Provincetown plans to raise \$50,000.

The rest will be asked from the federal and Massachusetts governments. It also was announced that the Daughters of the American Revolution are considering plans for placing a bust of Washington in St. Paul's Cathedral, in London. The bust where the bust will be placed is between those occupied by busts of Nelson and Wellington. The Daughters of the church will provide for a bust of Washington for Sulgrave Manor.

CHINA OPPOSES ANGLO-JAP PACT

Speakers At Philadelphia Meet Denounce Land-grabbing Spirit in Japan

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 4.—The Anglo-Japanese alliance, recently renewed for one year, was denounced today by speakers before the annual convention of the people's party of China, in session here. Delegates deplored that Great Britain had fallen into a snare, and declared the alliance was of no special benefit to England, but provided protection to Japan while she gains territory in China.

Ma Soo, chairman of the convention said that under the treaty "which promises to guarantee the integrity of China and the open door policy Japan is eating China piecemeal." He added that he also considered the treaty a menace to the United States.

The provisions in the Anglo-Japanese alliance, declared Mr. Soo, have not prevented Japan from strengthening her position east of the Pacific and placing a barrier between China and the outside world, particularly the United States. "If that treaty had not existed, we believe the Shantung question would have had a different settlement. Nations would have felt more free to criticize the position of Japan if she did not have the support of this alliance with Great Britain."

NATIONS' DEBTS WILL BE SHOWN

Germany and Austria Invited to Join International Financial Conference

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, Aug. 4.—By the Associated Press.—Representatives of 14 governments participating in the international financial conference to be held in Brussels on September 24 will be asked to present a balance sheet showing the national financial condition of their nations. It was decided at today's meeting of the council of the league of nations, in session here. All countries will be asked not to make further moves in money so as to avoid a further weakening of the foreign credit.

Efforts will be made through a committee of experts to arrive at an equitable arrangement for exchange between Germany and Austria and other nations, the money of the former being regarded as beyond restoration to its pre-war exchange value. The invitation to Germany to participate in this conference is conceded to be tantamount if she makes application, Thirty allied, neutral and enemy states will be asked to join in the conference, the program of which will comprise four principal subjects, exchange and parity, the circulation, commercial relations and the re-establishment of international credit.

"A rack sale" probably original with Ogden Store.

had been jeopardized by the soviet Premier Lloyd George stated that the soviet had not yet replied to Great Britain's note of July 30, proposing the London peace conference. He read the text of another note which Great Britain sent to the soviet government last Tuesday, after the soviet demand that the Polish armistice delegates be empowered also to sign fundamental terms of peace. This note said that if the soviet insisted on making peace with Poland to the exclusion of other powers, then the project for the London peace conference would have fallen through.

Asked whether the allies contemplated tightening the Russian blockade, the premier said: "I hope it will not be necessary to take steps to tighten the blockade, that must necessarily depend on an answer reaching us."

RECEIVED MESSAGE Premier Lloyd George said he had just received a message from George Tshitcherin, the soviet foreign minister, saying an urgent telegram was being sent to M. Kameneff in reply to Great Britain's note of Tuesday. The premier added he did not know what the Kameneff telegram contained.

Answering a question as to the involving of other countries in a new war, Premier Lloyd George said, "You don't go to war necessarily when you allow the transfer of munitions."

SPRINGFIELD, Mo.—Ernest White, twenty-nine, is dead and Jack Mead, thirty, is in jail at Forsyth following a pistol duel between the farmers culminating in a quarrel over \$1. Mead is alleged to have owed White as part of wages for working at the Mead farm.

The duel was fought at Hollister, White, fighting to the last, emptied his revolver of its last cartridge as he fell over dead. He had fired several shots at Mead after receiving his death wound with the first bullet from Mead's gun.
