STOCK SHIPMENTS FROM IDAHO IN FULL SWING

POCATELLO, Ida., Aug. 10.—Shipments of sheep and livestock from Idaho, which began ten days ago, are now in full swing...

Omaha seems to be the center of most of the shipping, while considerable stock is being sent to Kansas City and Chicago. Most of the sheep shipped so far were loaded at Hailey and Ketchum in the Wood River section.

The railroad officials believe that the car shortage has prohibited any extensive shipment of sheep from the western part of the state. Several trains also have been sent out from Soda Springs, consigned to eastern markets.

Range and Grazing Conference Is Set

(Special to The Standard-Examiner) LOGAN, Aug. 10.—The first series of annual conferences to be held at the Utah Agricultural college, Friday and Saturday, August 13 and 14. Representatives from Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, Montana and Colorado will be present.

The conference will discuss problems relating to the grazing of cattle on public lands and will arrive at some standardization of grazing methods. In all probability some co-operative grazing agreements will be outlined and started.

CONTINUE REHEARING OF RECEIVERS' FEES

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 10.—Rehearing was continued today in the third district court before Judge W. H. Stranwell in the matter of fees of Stephen H. Lynch, receiver for the Merchants bank and his counsel, Cheney, Jensen and Holman.

On the witness stand yesterday under examination, Frank E. Holman of the law firm, admitted that O. P. Soule, instigator of the protest against the fees is once fined by the court at \$31,000 for the receiver and \$100,000 for his counsel, had demanded a split of \$5000 in the fee to be received by the receiver.

BANKER MAY ENTER RACE FOR TREASURER

SALT LAKE, Aug. 10.—L. W. Curry, state legislator from Uinta county, is being urged to enter the contest for the nomination of state treasurer on the Democratic ticket by friends, according to word received here today.

Mr. Curry is now serving his second term as a member of the lower house of the state legislature. He is an old resident of the Uinta basin and has played an active part in the development of that section.

MOTHERS OF SOLDIER DEAD ARE VICTIMIZED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Exposure of what a war department announced by a charge of a "despicable swindle," by which the mother of a dead soldier was the victim, prompted today a new warning by the department that relatives of the soldier dead should pay no attention to any person or organization for information as to burial places. Inquiries will receive prompt attention, the warning said.

In the case exposed the grave of the soldier was never located. The swindler told the mother he would visit Washington if she would pay his expenses and see what could be done. Later he reported success and that the body would be sent home.

OIL WORKERS ON COAST SIGN WAGE AGREEMENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Renewal until August 31, 1921, of the agreement between employes and producers in the California oil fields was announced by the department of labor. The 15,000 oil workers affected will receive an increase of 75 cents a day and employes in all other branches of the industry will get an increase of 25 cents a day.

POOR GASOLINE GIVEN SALT LAKE

Government Tests Show Kerosene Seems to Be Used as Adulterant

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Evidence that refiners have been putting forth their utmost efforts to keep up with the increasing demand for motor gasoline, even reducing the quality to add to the quantity is disclosed in the summer test of motor fuel just completed by the bureau of mines. The report, after noting the tremendous increase in demand, continues:

To obtain sufficient gasoline, it has evidently been necessary for refiners to cut deeper into the crude oil, adding somewhat to the amount of high boiling material marketed as motor gasoline. The bureau places domestic consumption for the first five months of 1920 at twenty-six per cent over last year. The 1919 consumption for a like period was 1,217,879,949 barrels against 1,418,534,063 in 1920, an increase of 296,654,114 barrels.

SCOUTS CLIMB PEAK IN PARK

Mt. Washburn Scaled by Ogden and Salt Lake Boys in Yellowstone

DUNRAVEN PASS, Yellowstone Park, Wyo., Aug. 8.—After the greatest day of their scouting experience, the Boy Scouts from Ogden and Salt Lake today took the trail up Mt. Washburn, 10,385 feet in altitude, the most spectacular climbing of their trip.

Their stay at Canyon yesterday will long be remembered by the lads. From the time reveille was sounded until late in the evening of the big camp fire, the scouts were engaged in a round of sightseeing of absorbing interest. Bears of course, pleased them most and there were bears enough to satisfy everybody. A herd of deer wandered almost into camp. All the beautiful scenic points were visited, including the precious "Uncle Tom's Trail" down the side of the canyon to the pool at the bottom of the Lower Falls.

Finally the day was ended with a big campfire and vaudeville show, at which rangers of the canyon who have assisted scouts in every possible way were guests.

Chief of the program of the campfire show was a burlesque musical operation performed by Campmaster George H. Forstrom and Scoutmaster H. D. Koldewyn on Clarence Clark of Ogden. Clark is "Mutt" of the camp's famous "Mutt and Jeff" pair. "Jeff" being Willard Scowcroft, the nicknames having been bestowed because of the difference in the sizes of these inseparable two. A vaudeville sketch by Scowcroft and Clark led up to the operation.

FIVE CAPTIVE WARSHIPS HERE

Former Proud Vessels of German Navy Arrive in Bedraggled Shape

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Five captive warships once units of the proud German navy, but now humbled and battered relics of a defeated nation, came into New York harbor yesterday. Their arrival marked the beginning of their last year of existence, for when they serve their purpose as exhibits they will be sunk.

They were the dreadnought Ostfriesland, the cruiser Frankfurt, and three destroyers, the V-48, G-102 and S-132. Except the Ostfriesland, they are part of the great fleet that surrendered at Scapa Flow and after wards were sunk by their German crews. They were allocated to the United States in the division of captured vessels.

Led by the dreadnought, the only one that could move under her own power, they came up the Hudson as the sun was sinking. It was not an inspiring sight. River craft gave them a cold stare.

Because it was necessary to tow the Frankfurt and the destroyer, the voyage from British ports occupied more than a month. They came in naval formation.

A stop of a week was made at the Azores, where the Ostfriesland in the Ostfriesland was patched up. For the balance of the trip they averaged fifty miles an hour.

In command of the Ostfriesland was Captain J. F. Hedweg, with a crew of 400 men. From fifty to 100 men were assigned to each of the other craft.

For more than three months Captain Hedweg and his crew worked to make the warship navigable. The Germans had stripped her of all electric equipment and furniture. Temporary furniture for the officers was made of boxes. Her engines, however, were found in fairly good condition.

Due to their submergence at Scapa Flow, the battleship should be better than rusted hulks. The battleship, however, still is a powerful fighting unit, according to her crew. Some of the men still the guns are damaged beyond repair. It was not until new and clever devices for storage of coal and oil fuel were found.

As a fighter, the American jacks asserted, the battleship should be a "whale." She has six heavily armored turrets with guns from 12 to 14 inches. She carries 23 five-inch rifles and many three-inch rapid fire. Forward and aft are single torpedo tubes with twin tubes on all four quarters. Her armor is exceptionally heavy.

The Ostfriesland was in the battle of Jutland and she shows two scars. One forward and one aft, where British projectiles found marks. She was seriously damaged, however, by a mine placed before her as she withdrew. All damage was repaired.

The ships will be kept here a week or ten days and be open for inspection. Then they will go to other ports. Preceding their destruction they will be taken to navy yards and studied by naval experts.

On the decks of the dreadnought was returned to this country two 12 inch, two 14-inch guns shipped abroad during the war and stored at an American naval base as replacements for American battleships. These great guns made the trip lashed to the German ship's decks.
