Census-taking Not Complete But Fair Increase Is Indicated

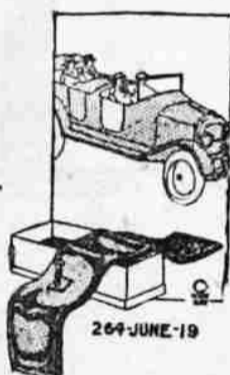

The school census has not been completed as yet but it is expected that the census taking will be completed and reports made during the present week. Thus far the workers report increases from 5 to 20 per cent over the same districts last year.

The weekly meeting of the board of education will be held Friday night. Bids for the construction work on the Washington school will be opened at the meeting and plans for an up-to-date athletic field made.

It is said that in the cargoes were airplanes and munitions evidently destined for General Wrangel who is leading an offensive against the soviet government in the Crimean region.
