Population of Metz Cheers as American Gift Is Presented to France

METZ, Alsace Lorraine, Aug. 21.—(By the Associated Press)—The statue of La Fayette, presented to France by the Knights of Columbus, was unveiled today by Supreme Knight James A. Flaherty, of Philadelphia. The population of Metz cheered when he drew aside the silk sheet veiling the statue, which stands on an audience dominating the valley of Moselle.

SEALED BY BLOOD

Mr. Flaherty said that the Knights of Columbus, as Catholic citizens of America, desired by this gesture to commemorate forever the holy bond of union between France and America sealed by the blood of French and American heroes.

NOT FITTING

"It is altogether fitting that the Knights of Columbus should select this historic spot as the object of their pilgrimage for was not Metz the starting point of La Fayette's American career? And was it not in Metz, that 10 years afterward, within the sacred precincts of St. Clement's college, Marshal Foch, the hero of the war, was laying deep the foundations of that character and genius which in later years stood civilization in such good stead and saved France?"

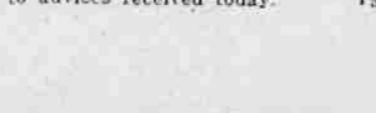
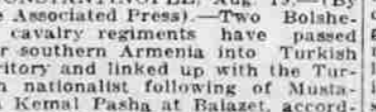
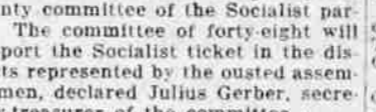
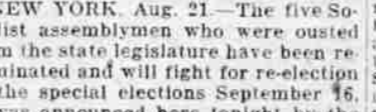
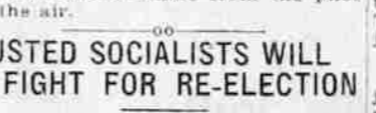
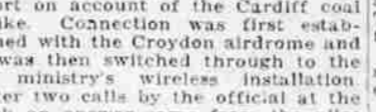
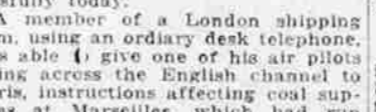
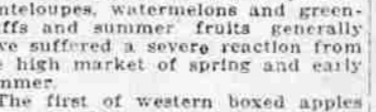
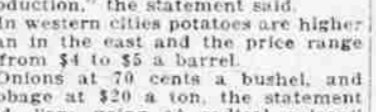
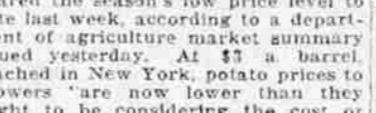
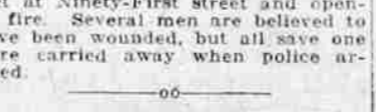
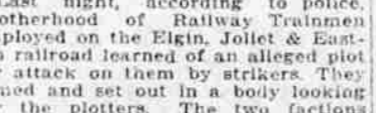
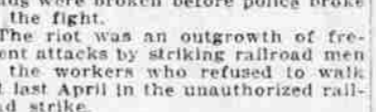
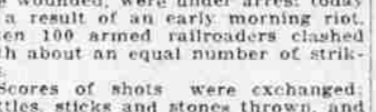
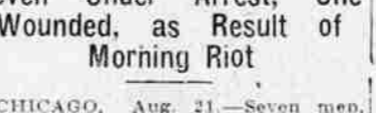
FRENCH ADVANCE TO AID YANKEE RELIEF WORKERS
