ANTWERP, Aug. 21.—Six American runners and an immense field of athletes of other nations are entered in the Marathon tomorrow. The Americans are Arthur V. Ross of Dorchester, Mass.; Carl W. A. Lindner, Quincy, Mass.; J. L. Organ, Pittsburg, Pa.; Charles J. Mellor, Ogden, Utah; C. C. Chicago, Frank Zuna, Newark, N. J., and J. P. Weber, Pittsburg.

A., fifth, 14.10, and Dan Ahern, holder of the world's record in the event, sixth, with 14.08.

Members of the Belgian Olympic committee sought to secure a change in the rules so as to permit runners to obtain refreshment such as light soup during the great ordeal, but the committee has ruled that the men will be permitted to receive only water.

NEW YORKER FIRST P. J. McDonald, New York A. C., won the final of the 56 pound weight put today with a put of 11.285 meters. H. Ryan, Loughlin system, New York was second with 10.95 meters. Lind, Sweden, was third with 10.25 meters; Archie McDiarmid, Canada, fourth, with 10.12; Svensson, Sweden, fifth, with 9.40, and Peterson, Finland, sixth, with 8.37 meters.

WATTIS WINS THIRD OF SALT LAKE DELEGATION AT PRIMARIES IN HARD TUSSLE WITH ODELL'S SUPPORTERS

(Special Dispatch.) SALT LAKE, Aug. 21.—In one of the greatest political battles that has ever been fought in Salt Lake county primaries, William H. Wattis of Ogden, candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, received fully one-third of the Salt Lake county delegation.

George Odell, the strongest Salt Lake candidate in the field, has obtained about 40 of the 138 delegates, and the other votes are scattered among the dozen other candidates for the nomination.

The victory for Mr. Wattis was won despite the fact that Charles M. Morris, Republican chairman of Salt Lake county, held back the list of polling places until the last minute, and no other candidate excepting George T. Odell, whom he is supporting, could get information as to primary officers and polling places.

The victory was highly gratifying to Mr. Wattis and to the thousands of Wattis supporters in Salt Lake county. In several districts there were allegations by other candidates that unfair tactics were employed and as a consequence it is declared likely that friendly contests will be brought before the state convention here next Thursday.

ENGLAND FACES NEW REBELLION

Conditions in Mesopotamia May Necessitate a Costly Military Campaign

LONDON, Aug. 20.—Fears are expressed here that recent events in Mesopotamia will involve Great Britain in a costly military campaign. Official reports show that the country is in a state of anarchistic rebellion against the British administration.

DISASTER CONFIRMED. According to official accounts the situation is much more serious than has been revealed in the official dispatches. Only last night the British issued a statement confirming the Arab revolt.

CAUSE OF REVOLT. The revolt is presumed to be against the methods of the British administration which is wholly in the hands of the British political and military officers.

COUNTRY IN DISORDER. The Arabs have appointed the brother of Prince Faisal, the king of Syria, as the ruler in the British sphere and summoned Arab representatives to meet at Bagdad to form a constitution for the Arab state in accordance with the mandate.

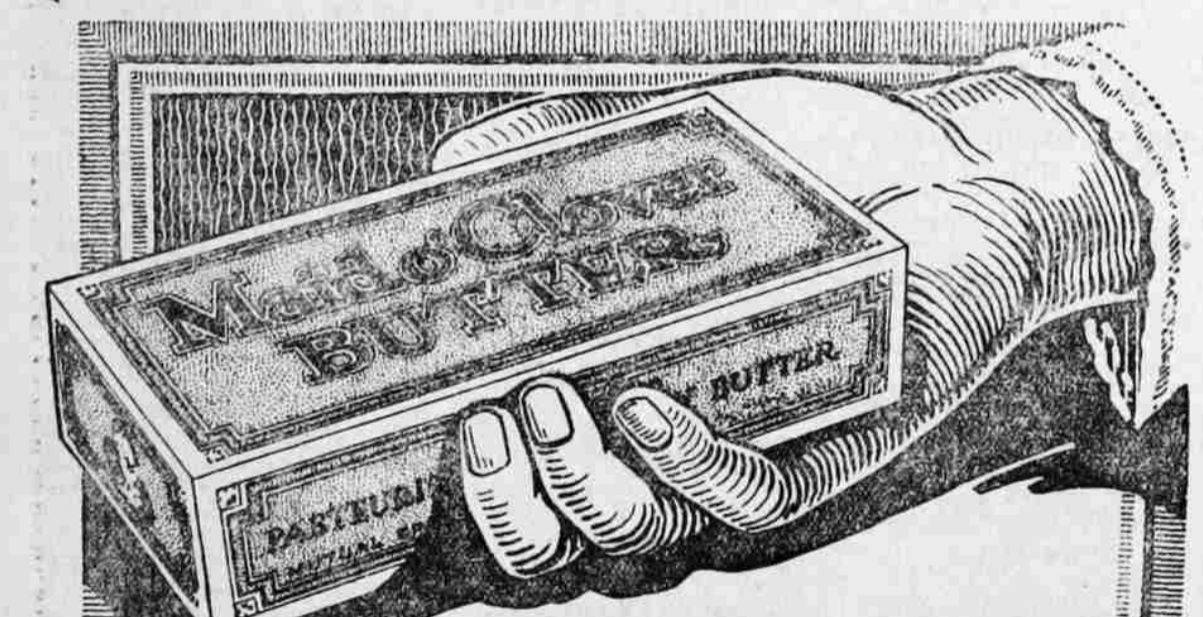
