#### Overland Limited Stopped by Tamped Signal Near Little Mountain

RUSE TO DRAW CREW FROM TRAIN SUSPECTED

Police, Sheriff and Railroad Detective Conducting Investigation Here

Four men and a Ford car figured in the mysterious stopping of the Overland Limited at Little Mountain on the Southern Pacific about 6:30 o'clock last night.

Investigation being conducted in the belief that an attempt was made to hold up and rob the train and its passengers.

The train was stopped for 27 minutes because the block signal had been tampered with in such a manner that the signal registered danger.

#### MIGHT BE RUSS

Whether this fight was staged to draw the members of the crew away from the train, or whether they were deliberately detained is a theory that is being used as a basis for one line of investigation.

WARSAW, Sept. 2.—(By The Associated Press.)—M. Danilovsky has resigned as head of the Russian peace delegation and has been replaced by Adolph Abramowicz, former soviet ambassador to Germany and chairman of the Russian peace delegation at Brest-Litovsk, according to advices received here.

Prince Sapieha, Polish foreign minister, received a wireless message from George Tchitcherin, Bolshevik minister of foreign affairs, stating that the essential condition of the Riga conference was a guarantee of the immunity of the Russian and Ukrainian delegates, the right to free and uninterrupted communication in code by telegraph and wireless and by courier carrying diplomatic sealed pouches.

A report made on Mayor MacSwiney's condition shortly after noon said he was rapidly approaching unconsciousness. He was too weak during the morning to carry on a conversation, it was said.

#### DRIVER OF BANK AUTO AND HUGE SUMS MISSING
