

DR. RAY PALMER RESIGNS PLACE

Pastor of First Baptist Church Returning to Evangelical Work

Dr. Ray Palmer, minister of the First Baptist church of this city, tendered his resignation to his congregation Sunday morning, the resignation to take effect on the last Sunday in October. Dr. Palmer said: "In resigning the pastorate of this church, I do so with nothing but love in my heart for every member of this church and congregation. I have been listening for the voice of God and now feel sure that I have heard His voice calling me. I must follow where He leads. My most earnest prayer will be that you will be divinely guided in calling my successor, that he may be a man of God who will lead you into green pastures and beside the still waters. During the two months that I am to be here, my purpose shall be to do all the good that I can in every way I can."

Following this, Dr. Palmer delivered a sermon on "The Divine Fullness."

Dr. Palmer intends to return to the evangelistic work which he formerly followed. No successor has been mentioned as yet.

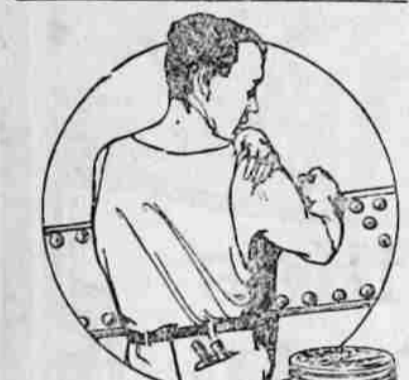
Tilden Wins Twice in Tennis Matches

LONDON, Sept. 6.—Terence MacSwiney, lord mayor of Cork, spent a restless night atrixton prison, where he is serving a hunger strike begun on August 12 in protest against his arrest by British authorities. Father Dominic, private chaplain to the lord mayor, visited the prison this morning and on leaving said the MacSwiney was "very low."

At noon it was announced that MacSwiney showed signs of much greater weakness, although he was still conscious and his mind was active. His face was more drawn and he was paler.
