BIG JUDGMENT AGAINST R. R.

U. S. Marshal Authorized to Collect \$36,515,038 From D. & R. G.

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 9.—With the issuance of a writ of execution here yesterday by United States District Judge Robert E. Lewis, the United States Marshal here has been authorized to collect judgment against the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, now in the hands of the receiver for \$36,515,038, together with 8 per cent interest, dating from January 7, 1918.

OPPOSED BUY, CUTLER SAYS

Witness Asserts He Was Against Grants Pass Purchase

TAX ASSOCIATION IN SESSION AT SALT LAKE
