CHARGE PLANS FOR PRIMARIES

Election Place Rearranged to Suit Convenience of Citizens

Arthur Woolley, Republican county chairman, yesterday issued the call for the election of delegates to the Republican mass primaries to be held in the election districts of Weber county on September 15 at 8 P. M. to elect delegates to the Republican county nominating convention which will be held September 18 at 10 A. M. in the Orpheum theatre.

The appointment of delegates to the county convention is upon the basis of the vote cast for Hon. W. H. Wattle for congress at the general election of 1918, each district being entitled to one delegate for each ten votes, or major fraction thereof, cast for Mr. Wattle at the election.

Under this arrangement there will be 276 delegates elected from the city districts, making a total of 394 delegates in the convention.

The call provides for the holding of the primaries for certain districts in Ogden City at places other than those heretofore used for primary purposes. It is the desire of the county chairman that the primaries for each of the five wards in Ogden City in one place for each ward, but in order to bring the voters closer to the polls in the various districts in remote sections of the wards, it was decided to rearrange the places of meeting.

Under this arrangement, District 1 will meet in the South Washington school house; Districts 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 meet in the Pingree school house; Districts 8, 9, 10 and 11 meet in the City Hall; District 12 meets in the Baptist church in West Ogden; District 13 meets at 250 West Twenty-second street; Districts 14 and 15 meet at the Armory on Twenty-fourth street; Districts 16, 17 and 18 meet in the Third ward amusement hall; Districts 19 and 20 in the Tenth ward amusement hall; Districts 21, 22 and 23 in the Fifth Points school house; Districts 24, 25, 26 and 27 in the Seventh ward amusement hall; Districts 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37 and 38 meet in the County House; Districts 39, 40, 41, 42 and 43 in the Lorin Farr school house; Districts 44 and 45 in the Twelfth ward amusement hall; Districts 46, 47, 48, 49 and 50 in the Fifth ward amusement hall; Districts 51 and 52 in the Lewis school, and Districts 53 and 54 in the Ninth ward meeting house.

In the county districts primaries will be held in the usual places, to be designated by the county committee-men.

ELECT COMMITTEEMEN. In addition to the delegates to the county convention, there will be elected in each of the several districts throughout the county a member of the county central committee and a district secretary.

The committee will nominate two state senators, four representatives, two county commissioners, a county treasurer, sheriff, clerk, recorder, attorney at law and assessor, and immediately upon the adjournment of the county convention the delegates thereto from the districts in Ogden City will convene a city convention for Ogden City for the purpose of nominating a city judge and precinct constable.

Special entertainment features have been provided for the entertainment of delegates to the usual convention. In addition to the usual address, there will be shown two moving picture films, one prepared by the Republican state committee showing the congressional and state candidates and the other prepared by the Republican national committee showing scenes of Warren G. Harding and Calvin Coolidge.

There is keen competition for all offices on the Republican legislative and county ticket and a full attendance of delegates is assured. There will be ample room in the theatre for the many spectators, who, it is expected, will attend to witness the proceedings and enjoy the entertainment features provided for the convention.

Special efforts are being made by the Republican county committee and Republican workers to bring out a large attendance of voters at the various primaries to insure a representative convention and wide popular support for the Republican ticket.

Extended Program on Brigham Peach Day

Brigham is to have a mammoth athletic program on Peach Day, September 15. Will Thornton, of Salt Lake, has promised the fans at Brigham a treat in the shape of wrestling and boxing contests.

It is announced the main attraction for this program will be the contest of Salt Lake, the middleweight wrestler, who is scheduled to meet several opponents in the one evening. A businessman has offered to make a wager that Dern cannot throw all the members of the Brigham baseball team in one hour. Some of the players have already agreed to the proposition and it is figured the deal will go through. Dern has also been challenged by a Canadian wrestler named Emil Peruse. He weighs 200 pounds and offers to throw Dern twice in one hour. In the boxing events it is being arranged for the best boys of Salt Lake and Ogden to tangle.

BUMPER CROPS IN GEN STATE

Idaho Farmers Look Forward To Prosperity Says S. P. Official

That Idaho will experience one of her best agricultural years this year is the opinion of William G. Wilson, traveling agent for the Southern Pacific who returned yesterday from an extensive trip to points in Idaho in the interest of his road.

The prune crop will be the largest in the history of the state, according to Mr. Wilson, and will compare favorably with the crops of other states. The potato crop this season will be 95 per cent normal which is far better than has been recorded in other seasons. Last year's crop was 75 per cent normal.

"Potatoes are now selling at \$1 per bushel while hay is selling at the stack at \$4 per ton," said Mr. Wilson. "On account of the abundance of hay throughout the state this season the farmers have decided to feed their cattle this winter during the coming winter."

The wheat and grain crops are also superior to those of 1919 and will no doubt shatter all records. Shipments of wheat and grain in Idaho have been delayed for some time owing to the car shortage but the farmers contemplate on shipping a record crop this fall.

"Politics in the state is also warming up and considerable interest has been manifested in the coming national and state election. All in all Idaho is looking forward to her greatest year and from all indications the farmers will have a new record when they quit work for the winter."

Last Train From Park on Sept. 20

More than 35,000 tourists have visited Yellowstone National park this season over the Oregon Short Line according to Department S. H. Tracy of the Ogden Union Railway company.

The season for tourists travel to the wonderland will be halted for the 1920 year, September 20, when the Yellowstone Special will be withdrawn until next season, so far as regular daily travel is concerned. After September 20, mixed weekly runs will be maintained from Ashton, Idaho, to Yellowstone. This trip will be made on Sundays.

Records compiled by railroad officials show that the travel over the Oregon Short Line during the past season to the park has shattered all past records.

Make Assignment for Benefit of Creditors

The Glasmann-Wilfong Automobile company yesterday made an assignment of its holdings for the benefit of creditors. A. J. Langlois was appointed the assignee, taking hold of the company's affairs at noon.

A statement issued by the company, it was announced that the assets would total about \$30,000, with the liabilities about \$25,000, and there was little chance that any of the creditors would lose a penny.

BUY OWN HOMES

An unusually large amount of realty is changing hands this fall. Hundreds have decided that the owning of a home is the only solution of their problems. In nine cases out of ten, it is said other parties than the owners occupied the homes and were, and are being given 30 days notice to clear out, joining the ranks of the restless, ever seeking hunters of homes.

One instance has been reported where a party purchased a house to use this winter. The house was being rented. Without giving notice, the owners demanded the occupants to evacuate. Furniture belonging to the owners was shipped from a nearby city, and while the tenants scurried about the city in an effort to rent a home, the owners made an attempt to move the furniture belonging to them into the already occupied house. So far the owners of the house have been unsuccessful in driving the tenants out. No notice was served that the tenants were to leave at a certain time, and from present indications the case will wind up before authorities of the city.

Those who have houses look at friends seeking houses and feel sympathetic, and scores of the seekers, after vain attempts to locate in this city and pursue their chosen work, have been forced to depart, still in search of a place where children are not looked down upon, and where the procuring of a shelter during the winter is at least possible.
