

NATION WATCHES COLORADO SCRAP

Non-Partisan League Strong; Primaries Watched With Great Interest

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CHICAGO, Sept. 14.—Today marks the close of the series of primary elections in which the two parties are trying to capture control of the state senate. Party leaders everywhere admit that the control of the senate in the November election is more important than the presidential election. Republican leaders, who believe that Harding will win overwhelmingly, consider that the senatorial elections in Colorado are more doubtful and Democratic leaders, who concede that Cox may lose, claim that they can capture at least two senatorships from the Republicans.

The present Republican majority in the senate is two. Publicly, the Republicans are claiming that they will add eight or ten to that majority. That, however, is practically impossible.

Two of the states in which both the Republicans and the Democrats claim that they can elect a senator hold their primaries today. In Colorado the term of the present Democratic Senator, Charles S. Thomas, ends with the coming session. Senator Thomas was strongly urged to enter the Democratic primaries for the nomination to succeed himself. Although the urging went the length of filing a petition putting him in nomination in public life, except as a member of the city council. The third candidate on the Democratic ticket is W. H. Callicott, who was rather wished on the Democratic party by the Non-Partisan League, which at one stage recently seemed to have captured the Democratic party machinery. The strength of the Non-Partisan League in Colorado has turned out to be surprising. Callicott years ago was a Populist and an office-holder by appointment under the Governor of Colorado, who a generation ago, was known as the "bloody-bill" of the east as "bloody-bill" of the west. Callicott is for the closed shop and the eight-hour day for the uplift and the good.

HITCHCOCK SEES SENATE MENACE

Audiences Before Front Porch Are Hand Picked, Senator Declares

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—United States Senator Gilbert M. Hitchcock, of Nebraska, speaking before the Arkwright club here today, declared Governor Cox if elected would exercise his office as they were exercised by Wilson, Roosevelt, Cleveland, Lincoln and other strong men of both parties while Senator Harding, if elected, would exercise his presidential powers "under some form of dictatorship by a senatorial oligarchy in control of party machinery."

"If this question can be fairly considered by the voters," he said, "it seems to me a majority will decide in favor of an individual president rather than a president acting as a grouphead for a combination of senators."

HAND PICKED AUDIENCES

The Republican managers, relying on the belief that their party is the strongest, have adopted a platform which may be interpreted in several different ways, after the election, on a number of important issues. They have nominated a candidate of their own choice and have relegated him to his front porch. They have brought before him hand picked audiences for formal addresses and meanwhile, have devoted their energies to the collection and use of campaign funds to be used in organizing for the campaign. They are living up to the idea that all that is necessary is to get out the party strength to insure a party victory.

The Democratic program, the senator said, consists of a direct appeal to the people of the country without regard to party, on the issues of the day.

PLATFORM BOLD

The Democratic platform is bold and outspoken," he continued, "while the Republican platform is ambiguous and doubtful. Governor Cox is not only the party candidate, but a party leader as well, while Senator Harding is becoming the candidate does not apparently aspire to interfere with party leadership which remains with those who made him the candidate.

Senator Harding says he believes in party government and if he is elected the Republican party will govern. It sounds as though the rank and file of the Republican party were to reach important decisions and shape party policies. The real meaning of it, however, is that the party caucus of United States senators in Washington would in those circumstances run the government just as they ran the late Republican convention. Obviously, this is a party campaign of misrepresentation and falsehood. It harmonizes with dodging the issue and deceiving the voter."

Necessary measures consistent with our national honor, to relieve them of their difficulties.

PROBLEM PRESENT.

"The problem incident to racial differences must be accepted as one existing in fact and must be adequately met for the future security and tranquility of our people. We have learned the necessity of making the discipline of this republic not only American in heart and soul, but American in every sympathy and aspiration.

"No one can tranquilly contemplate the future of the republic without anxiety for abundant provision for admission to our shores of only the immigrant who can be assimilated and thoroughly imbued with the American spirit.

"From the beginning of the republic America has been a haven to the oppressed and the aspiring from all the nations of the earth. We have opened our doors freely and have given to the peoples of the world who came to us the fullness of American opportunity and political liberty. We have come to that stage of our development where we have learned that the obligations of citizenship of necessity must be assumed by those who accept the grant of American opportunity. From this time on we are more concerned with the making of citizens than we are with adding to the manpower of industry or the additional human units in our varied activities.

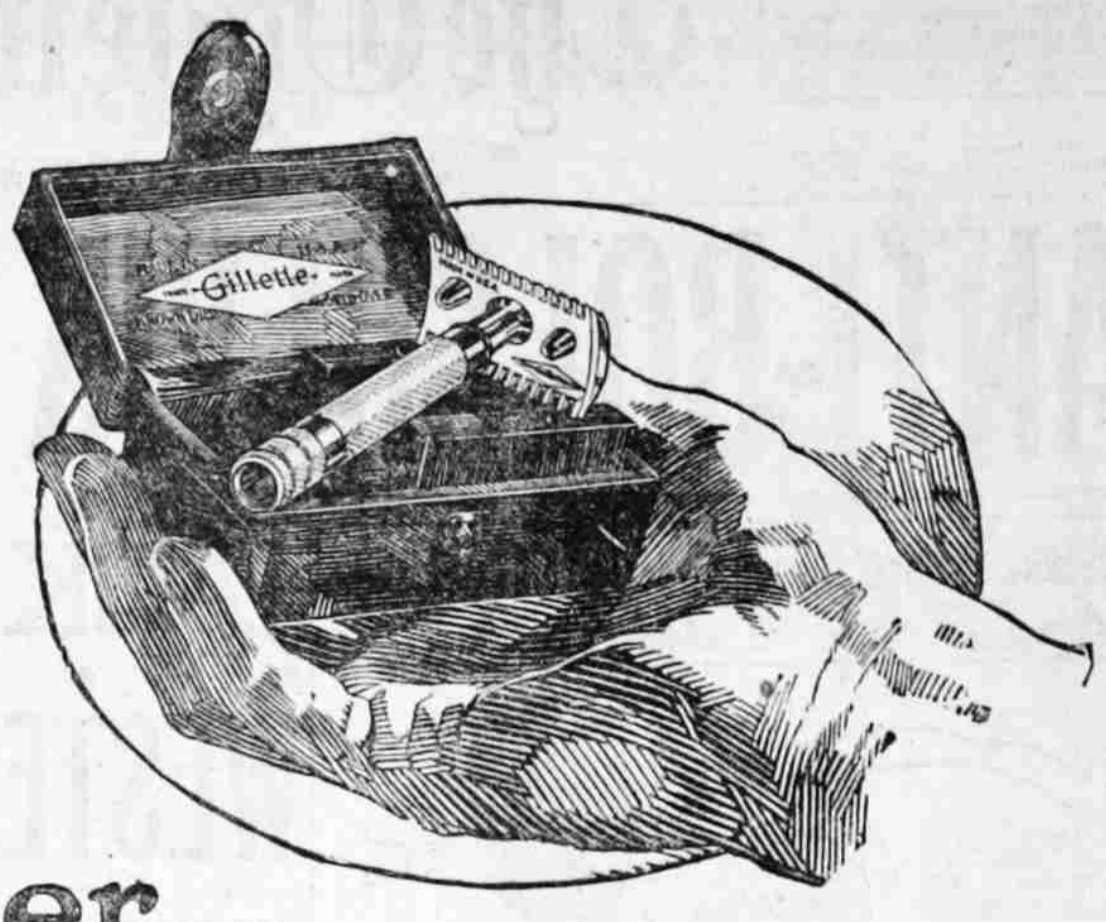
POWER TO REGULATE.

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES

On the Republican side, there are two leading candidates. One is Sam W. McCallister, an elderly Leadville mining man, without much previous political experience, except as a Republican party worker several years ago. The other is Karl C. Schuyler, an active Denver lawyer, a new comer in politics, regarded as able. He, like McCallister, is wealthy, being credited with having made a fortune in Wyoming oil.

A third Republican candidate, Colonel Rice W. Means, is running chiefly on the basis of being the "buddie" candidate, having been an infantry colonel in the Fortieth Division. He is a lawyer of fair ability and clean record, who says he wants to find out what chance a poor man has against two millionaires.

Between the two winners of these primaries the fight in November will be very bitter. Colorado is one of the states that both parties will fight hard for.

WASHINGTON PRIMARIES

Washington also holds its primaries today to elect candidates for the succession to Senator Wesley L. Jones. Senator Jones is opposed for the Republican nomination by a decidedly popular soldier, Colonel W. M. Inglis, who made an exceptionally good record as the leader of a Washington regiment in France. Senator Jones is also opposed by a less formidable candidate of the radical section of the party.

For the Democratic nomination there is only one candidate, George H. Cotterill, a Seattle man of more than average ability, who is under the handicap of having come to be regarded as a rather chronic seker. It is quite generally believed that the Democrat will have little chance in the election in November, and that if Senator Jones wins today, he will succeed himself.

Today is also the date of the very interesting and important primaries in New York, which will give the first decision in Senator Wadsworth's effort to succeed himself. Republican party leaders everywhere throughout the nation are watching this effort with intensely sympathetic interest.

PRIVATE GAMBLING HALL IN OMAHA IS ROBBED

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 14.—Two armed and masked bandits held up and robbed about twenty men who were gambling in a private apartment here Sunday, escaping with about \$7000, according to a report reaching the police today. The report, however, was not made to any of the hold-up men's victims, it was said.

CATTLE GROWING INDUSTRY LAGS

Disinclination of Farmers is Causing Meat Famine, Packers Declare

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 14.—Growing disinclination by farmers to raise cattle, owing to the cost involved, is causing a meat shortage, according to speakers at the opening session yesterday of the annual convention of the American Meat Packers' association. The convention, it was announced by Thomas E. Wilson, Chicago, president of the association, will endeavor to devise a plan to overcome this shortage. He declared that the restriction of credit and the general financial stringency has forced many producers to market their livestock prematurely, with resultant losses.

L. F. Swift, Jr., Chicago, declared that the big packers had made every effort to give the people a clearer idea of the "unfalling, economical service rendered by the packers." In the last twelve months, he declared, "no group of business men has disclosed the fundamentals of their business so completely to the public as have the meat packers. I can say honestly that the whole packing industry has as little to be ashamed of and as much to be proud of as any industry."

GERMAN PAPER CLOTHING INTERESTS MAKERS HERE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Paper suits imported from Germany by the department of commerce will go on an exhibition tour of the country starting Wednesday. Representatives of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce in principal cities are to show the suits, which cost from 15 cents to \$2.50 to manufacturers and clothing firms.

Samples of the paper suits were imported because of the inquiries arising from reports that German and Austrian manufacturers were selling them in England, Italy and Turkey in competition with cloth suits from other countries.

FIGHT TO SAVE BRIDE DESCRIBED BY HUSBAND

RACINE, Wis., Sept. 14.—John Jones, whose bride of six weeks was drowned Sunday in Lake Michigan when their boat overturned, recovered sufficiently from injuries received in fighting the waves to give details.

Jones said he clung to the boat for hours while holding his wife and that she died in his arms.

"I tried to keep hold of her even when I knew she was dead," he said, "but gradually my arms grew numb and she slipped into the water."

Authorities said they saw no reason to doubt any of Jones' statements. Jones' body was black and blue with bruises.

WILSON'S R. R. AIMS ATTACKED

Harding Lauds Cummings-Esch Act and Condemns Plumb Plan

MARION, O., Sept. 14.—Reaffirming his support of the Cummings-Esch act restoring the railways to their owners, Senator Harding charged in a speech to a delegation of railway workers late yesterday that by assuming control of the roads at all the Wilson administration had sought to promote a policy based on permanent government operation.

Had the experiment proved a success, the Republican nominee declared, the administration would have favored retention of the transportation lines and the other public utilities under government control. The war, he said, had offered an opportunity to try out the scheme only because it permitted administration officials to take advantage of the anxieties of the people," in asking authority to take over the properties.

The senator also assailed the "socialistic and revolutionary" plan supported by some labor leaders to put the railroads at the disposal of the railway workers. The Cummings-Esch bill, he said, was the best measure congress could work out in the time allotted and gave to both railroad owners and employees a just guarantee of rights.

Several hundred union men, composing the Harding and Coolidge railway club of Marion, were in the delegation and they cheered the nominee as he hit at class rule and lauded the labor provisions of the act.

They carried banners expressing their support in such inscriptions as "The government must change conductors." Harding will not sidetrack us," and "Safety first, elect Harding."

MINE OPERATOR'S WIFE ACCUSED OF SLAYING

JOPLIN, Mo., Sept. 14.—Mrs. Charles Dorman, 24 years old, is held in the Cherokee county jail at Columbus, Kansas, in connection with the death of her husband, a mine operator who was found dead in his home at Trece, Kan., Sunday morning with a bullet wound in his head and another in his chest.

Dorman, 30 years old, was garbed in night clothing. A revolver lay on the floor near the bed. The Dorman has three children but none was at home at the time.

AUTO TRUCK DOES WORK: RAILROAD WANTS TO QUIT

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—The automobile truck has superseded the Ocean Shore Railroad, running south from this city for about 45 miles, to such an extent the road cannot longer make a profit, according to testimony of J. W. Crosby, the road's auditor, here today. Crosby was a witness at a hearing by the railroad commission on the road's application for permission to cease operating.
