LEAGUE SEEKS TO MEAT SUPPLY OF HALT FIGHTING NATION LESSENS

Bolsheviki Declared to Be Complicating Situation in North

RIGA, Sept. 15.—By the Associated Press.—The Lithuanian government received the suggestion today from the supreme council that the fighting between Lithuania and Poland be discontinued and the dispute referred to the executive council of the league of nations. No reply has been made but it appears unlikely that the Lithuanians will consent, apparently having slight faith in the league of nations. Andre Lewicki, Ukrainian foreign minister, has sought to establish peace negotiations between Russia and general Petrus, but the Bolsheviki replied that such application must be made to the Ukrainian soviet government.

The Bolsheviki clearly are supporting Ukrainian and Lithuanian contentions to embarrass Poland and will also probably support the claims of White Russia for independence, in an effort to complicate the situation. But the main boundary question at issue is whether Vilna shall be Polish or Lithuanian.

The Bolsheviki claims for establishment of the workmen's civil militia in free Poland and gifts of land to soldiers are regarded by experts as for propaganda purposes.

The Bolsheviki delegation discredited the report of a revolution in Petrograd. Weary of war and endless peace parleys, Riga is paying little attention to the coming negotiations between the Poles and Bolsheviki. This city of formerly nearly 400,000 inhabitants has been reduced to 150,000. Letts are much discouraged over the ruin wrought by the war, but are loud in their expressions of satisfaction that the Russian Bolsheviki have been expelled from Latvia and other Baltic states. The Polish delegation is expected to arrive from Warsaw Thursday. The conference probably will open Friday.

FEARING BLINDNESS, HE ENDS LIFE WITH POISON

FALLS CITY, Neb., Sept. 16.—Dr. C. T. Burchard, chairman of the Richardson county insanity board, and secretary of the state board of health, under Governor Morehead, committed suicide in his home here last night by taking poison. Failing health and fear of approaching blindness is given as the cause for the doctor's act. He had often told his family that if he should go blind he "would not tarry long."

ARRANGE LEAGUE DEBATE.

(By International News Service.) ALBUQUERQUE, N. M.—Ex-Attorney General W. B. Pattangall has accepted the challenge of State Senator Gillen, of Bannock, Republican, to debate the league of nations and a meeting place is being arranged. Pattangall will defend the league.

F. D. ROOSEVELT DOWNIS HARDING

G. O. P. Platform Is Termed Hymn of Hate Against Democrat Progress

BOSTON, Sept. 16.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, speaking here last night, said that the Republican campaign had been one of "vituperation and condemnation of everything any Democrat has done for eight years." He said the Republicans had offered nothing but "a platform composed of glittering generalities," while Democrats favored "a definite program of progress at home and in connection with our international relations."

"The Republican platform," he said, "is a hymn of hate that tries to purely partisan reasons to condemn the things that have been done, not only by the Democratic administration but by the American people during their participation in the war." Senator Harding was characterized as Mr. Roosevelt was "a reactionary who always plays safe, never offering anything constructive."

MINING FOR BULLETS ON CAMP LEWIS RANGE

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 15.—Mining for bullets, with the consent of the government, is now under way at Camp Lewis. A complete jig, as used in lead mining fields, has been installed, and 1200 pounds of lead, copper and nickle are being "mined" daily.

F. H. Lamley, of Seattle, decided that there was an abundance of metal back of the camp target ranges, where millions of rounds of ammunition of all kinds were fired while troops were in training during the war.

TEN AMERICAN VESSELS SOLD TO FOREIGNERS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—The American Shipbuilding company has been authorized by the shipping board to sell ten steel steamships of 6000 deadweight tons each for transfer to foreign registry. This is the first authority for the sale to foreign account of American ships granted by the board under the terms of the new merchant marine act.

The board's announcement today said the American company has been unable to interest steamship companies in this country in the purchase of the craft and consequently had negotiated for their sale abroad. Built for the Great Lakes for the American company's account, the steamers will be transferred to French, British, Norwegian, Swedish, Danish, Belgian, Spanish and Italian registry.

INTERCEPTED S. O. S. CALL FROM 'SUB' IS APPROVED

FARRINGTON, Conn., Sept. 16.—David L. Moore, a radio operator who caught a call for assistance telling of the plight of the crew of the submarine S-3 recently, has been informed by the bureau that the call he did not violate the spirit of any wireless regulation.

BOTH ARE DEAD BUT WEDDED, ANYHOW

TOKYO, Sept. 4.—(Correspondence.)—An unusual marriage today followed the suicide of a couple, who jumped into the sea recently from the cliffs of Atami, a resort town on the Izu peninsula, south of here.

LEAGUE IS 'DEATH TRAP,' BILLINGS' AUDIENCE TOLD

BILLINGS, Mont., Sept. 15.—Arrangement of the league of nations as a "death trap" and a "military alliance for war" was made here yesterday by Lieutenant Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and Raymond Robins in two addresses each in the afternoon and evening. They spoke to a meeting of women this afternoon and at separate places last night.

BELIEVE BIG PLANE FELL IN JOURNEY OVER ALPS

GENEVA, Sept. 16.—A large hydro-airplane, last seen over the Alps last week near Saint Gothard, is being sought. The machine is believed to have fallen into an abyss. It was being taken from Italy to Finland, having been purchased for the Finnish army.

POLITICAL RIVALRY IN YUCATAN IS INTENSE

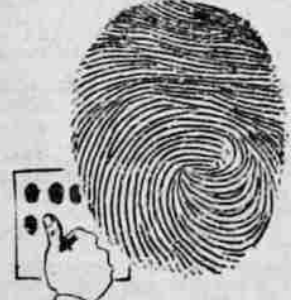
MEXICO CITY, Sept. 16.—Recent disorders in Yucatan resulted from political rivalry, and were not caused by communists, it was declared by Provisional President de la Huerta. The two leading Yucatan parties are the socialists and the liberal constitutionalists, the latter having about 80 per cent of the voting strength. Recent reports have said that the city of Yucatan had been controlled by Bolsheviki, who were captured by government troops.

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
