OGDEN'S MILK PASSES TESTS

Dairies Living Up to Requirements, City Inspector Finds

Tests of milk sold by dairies in Ogden have just been completed by John Felt, city milk inspector, and show that the product being retained here is of high standard and has passed all requirements with flying colors. Every sample goes far above the standard requirement in percentage of butter fat and total percent solids, and the rigid tests have shown that great care is taken in regard to cleanliness.

TESTS GRATIFYING

The tests have proven extremely gratifying to Mr. Felt, and in announcing the results of the tests he said that local dairies are doing all in their power to keep their product on a par with the best in the entire country.

The standard requirement in percentage of butter fats is 3.2 per cent. All the twelve dairies in the city have passed this mark by a large margin. The standard requirement in total percent solids is 12.00, and the tests show them also far above in this respect. Dirt or sediment has not been found in any sample.

The samples were taken from the dairy wagons on the streets and no indication was given that the tests were going to be made when the milk was secured by Mr. Felt.

UTAH WEATHER FINE FOR CROPS

Only Few Weeks More Needed For Maturing Says Weekly Bulletin

Excellent crop maturing and harvesting weather has continued throughout Utah, though the commercial tomato, alfalfa seed, and third alfalfa crops need from one to two weeks good weather yet for maturing, says the weekly weather and crop bulletin issued by J. Cecil Aller, state meteorologist.

Peaches of an especially fine quality are ripening rapidly and being gathered, apples are coloring and maturing satisfactorily as a rule, and the earlier varieties are being gathered. The alfalfa and sweet clover seed crops are ripening more rapidly with the warmer, drier weather, and the cutting is being pushed quite generally, without frost or other injury to date.

Highways are still showing the effects of recent rains and continue hard and smooth over much of the state.

Utah Beet Crop to Top Last Year Mark

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—The sugar beet crop this year promises to exceed early estimates made by the department of agriculture. Recent reports indicate a total yield of 3,229,000 tons. Out of this Utah is expected to produce 1,327,000 tons and Idaho 502,000 tons.

If these predictions are realized the Utah crop will exceed the crop of 1918 by 313,000 tons, while Idaho's crop will more than double that of last year.
