SEEK DRIVER OF ONE-HORSE WAGON AS BOMBER

'RED' WORKERS MENACE CONSULATE Experts Declare Huge Bomb Caused Harvest of Death in Gotham

HARDING RAPS U. S. CONQUEST OF REPUBLICS

Senator Says "Rape" of Tiny Nations Discloses Usurping of Powers CONSTITUTION NEVER HAS FAILED, HE SAYS

Utterances of Franklin Roosevelt on Case Are Called Shocking Assertions

MARION O. Sept. 17.—Pronouncing the league of nations covenant irreconcilable with the American constitution, Senator Harding declared in a Constitution Day address here today that the time has come for the United States to decide whether it would preserve or abandon the charter under which it achieved nationality.

"The constitution or the covenant, that is the paramount issue," he said. "The two are irreconcilable. We cannot be governed from across the water and Washington. We cannot follow our present chief magistrate without forsaking the father of our country."

"The Republican nominee also assailed the administration's policy toward the smaller nations of the western hemisphere, asserting that the executive had usurped congressional powers to carry on an unconstitutional war with Haiti and San Domingo. He declared the recent utterances of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the Democratic nominee for vice president, had revealed officially for the first time the American government's "rape" of the two little republics.

"The speech, delivered from the front porch to delegations from several Ohio counties, reviewed the circumstances surrounding the making of the constitution and outlined the candidate's conception of the balanced powers of the executive, legislative and judicial branches of the government. "The constitution has never failed America," he continued, "and despite headless assertions to the contrary, America has never failed the world. And now, as public opinion stands ready, and let us hope, will soon be in a position, through earnest co-operation of all branches of our government to lend a helping hand to the world."

"How can we, then, in reason and with confidence, make sure of fulfilling our mission on earth? The first step is to do so strictly, calmly and scrupulously observe in letter and in spirit, the mandates of the constitution of the United States. We are not doing so. We are not at war, not alone technically with Germany, but actually with the little, helpless republics of our own hemisphere. The wars upon our neighbors to the south were made and are still being waged, though never declared, through the usurpation by the executive of powers not only never bestowed upon him, but usurped without his consent."

GOVERNOR COX HAS PRAISE FOR HIRAM JOHNSON

Californian Declared to Stand Out Because of His Progressive Tendencies REACTION SCORED IN SACRAMENTO ADDRESS

Nominee Likens 1920 G. O. P. Convention to One Bitterly Assailed By Roosevelt

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 17.—In an address here today opening his California campaign, Governor Cox of Ohio, Democratic presidential candidate, praised Senator Hiram Johnson, Republican, who resides here as an exponent of progressivism and again flayed "big business," and Republican leadership, "big business" and "big money."

"He and I do not agree on international policies," said Governor Cox to a large outdoor audience at a noon convention at 1 o'clock in the city hall.

"I have looked with admiration on the fight which he has made throughout the years against reaction. He fought it with Roosevelt and he continued consistently the contest which began in 1912, through the primaries and the convention of 1919, just as Roosevelt would have done."

"As an Ohioan, I give to you the assurance that the observation made by a distinguished citizen of our state to the effect that Hiram Johnson was a blackguard and unfit to associate with decent men is not the view of our people. It is the opinion of the people of Ohio that Hiram Johnson is a candidate before the Republican primaries in Ohio this year he would have carried them."

"The reactionary senatorial oligarchy gains control of the government in this campaign, it will manipulate the power of patronage that the people have placed in his hands, and he will be compelled to join another party or to form one of his own."

ITALIANS SEEK TO LOWER OLD GLORY IN GENOA

Attempted Violation Reported To State Department at Washington RADICAL LEADERS SEE VICTORY FOR STAND

Premier Threatens Employers Unless They Make Concessions to Labor

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—An attempted violation of the American consulate at Genoa, Italy, by workmen displaying red flags who sought to force the lowering of the American flag during a funeral of workmen was reported today to the state department.

"The report of the incident was communicated by Vice Consul Murphy at Genoa through the American embassy at Rome. The funeral was of workmen who had been shot during a clash with Italian police authorities in the disturbances of September 10. As the procession was passing the consulate a number of workmen rushed into the building and tried to enter the consular building, but were stopped by half a dozen Italian police men."

"The Italian authorities promptly expressed regret over the incident. "BIG VICTORY SEEN MILAN, Sept. 16.—Leaders of the Confederation of Labor and workers generally are confident that they have won a great victory in the decision of Premier Giolitti to appoint a commission to submit concrete proposals respecting participation by workmen in the technical, financial and disciplinary management of factories which was announced at Turin today. This commission's report will be made the basis for a new law which will be the result of the demands made by metal workers since they have occupied industrial plants throughout the country."

"The foreign minister's communication was dated at Moscow September 16 and has been published in the London Daily Herald, organ of labor. M. Tchitcherine says Mr. Colby considers the demand for independence of Poland, Finland and Armenia legal, saying that Russia is not interested in force and the desire for independence of the Georgian, Azerbaijan, Lithuanian, Latvian, Estonian and Ukrainian peoples, either in the form of complete independence or in federation illegal."

SOVIET LEADER MAKES REPLY TO COLBY NOTE

Foreign Minister Says Secretary of State Is Not Informed

LONDON, Sept. 17.—Distinctions drawn by Bainbridge Colby between Poland, Finland and other sections of Russia, which were made in the course of Mr. Colby's note of August 10 to the Italian ambassador in Washington, are impossible to understand and probably the result of insufficient information as to the real facts of national conditions in eastern Europe," says George Tchitcherine, Russian Bolshevik minister of foreign affairs. M. Tchitcherine has addressed a note to the Italian and to "soviet representatives abroad," in which he answers some of the conclusions reached by Mr. Colby in discussing Russian affairs.

"The exceptions allowed for by Mr. Colby," says the foreign minister, "undermine the more categorical his adherence to the territorial inviolability of the former czarist empire, while at the same time his friendliness toward Russia is conditional upon the fact that her government shall not be a soviet government. As a matter of fact any other government at present is a bourgeoisie or capitalist government, and in view of the present economic unification of the world, that means a government connected with the interests of the world's dominating financial groups. Among these, as a result of the world war, the most powerful are the North American financial groups."

SIX CHEMISTS NOT AT WORK UPON MYSTERY

Chief Flynn Says He Is Positive Explosion Was Caused By Bomb

CARRY DEATH MACHINE IN WAGON IS BELIEF Fragments From Device May Furnish Clue Resulting In Arrests

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—William J. Flynn, chief of the bureau of investigation, department of justice, declared this morning he was positive that a bomb had caused the explosion in Wall street yesterday which took a toll of 36 lives, injured about 200 persons and caused property damage running into the millions.

"There is absolutely no doubt that it was a bomb," said Chief Flynn. "An important development in the last two hours has convinced us of this. The bomb was apparently placed by a person who was within four blocks of Wall and Broad streets when the explosion occurred."

"Six expert chemists attached to the bureau of investigation of the department of justice, who were called to the interior arrived at police headquarters this afternoon from Washington and assisted in reconstructing metal fragments believed to have been part of a bomb."

"The theory of the investigators is that a time bomb was placed on the wagon and that the driver hurried from the scene just after arranging for the explosion to occur at noon."

"Six expert wagon makers expressed the opinion at police headquarters that the driver was a man of about 35 years of age, of medium height, wearing a dark suit, and that he was driving a 1919 model Ford sedan. The car was found with a hole in the top of the roof, and a hole in the rear window, and a hole in the front fender. The hole in the front fender was about 12 inches in length, was hot when it fell."

PARIS, Sept. 14.—(By The Associated Press.)—The American doughboys need not take off his hat to any soldier of any army engaged in the great war. There were some as good as he, but none better."

"Thus spoke General Marie Emile Fayolle, of the French army, who used in the counter-offensive against the Germans alongside the French troops seven American divisions. He was talking before his department for the United States where he is to represent the French army at the convention of the American Legion in Cleveland."

"The Americans were simply magnificent, he concluded, as a matter of fact, some were brave to such an extent as one might call it rashness."

"Magnificent, marvelous, as General Fayolle kept repeating. "Your soldiers were not only men of regard courage, but also in endurance and unflinching good humor. But there was one branch in which they were deficient, and it was one of the most important."

"They could not cook, or they were too busy fighting to bother about such trifles as cooking."

"The general will be accompanied to the United States by Lieutenant Colonel Requin, a member of Marshal Foch's mission to America, and also Lieutenant Soubrin, his interpreter. This will be the general's first visit to the United States."

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
