### COAST "LIFER" HELD AT JAIL

W. H. Wickham, Who Escaped From San Quentin, Being Taken Back to Prison

W. H. Wickham, escaped lifer from San Quentin prison, California, is at the city jail. He was brought from Pocatello, Ida., by J. W. Reid, an officer from San Quentin, detailed to return Wickham to the prison from which he escaped on July 19, 1920.

Wickham, a middle-aged man, was convicted of first degree murder in 1915 following the killing and robbing of a man 65 years old of \$85.

He claims to have escaped from the prison by swimming from the bay island where it is located, a feat which Officer Reid declares is impossible. The portion of the bay which Wickham claimed to have swum is a mud flat at low tide, the mud being similar to quicksand in consistency, Reid said. At high tide, the water is not more than four feet deep at the most.

Wickham was arrested at Idaho Falls following an attempt on his part to secure funds from his parents in California. He maintains that he is innocent and merely pleaded guilty to shield a friend who committed the murder. His brother-in-law is alleged to have said that Wickham robbed his victim of \$85, however.

While in the Idaho Falls prison, Wickham nearly escaped from the second time. He was arrested on the act of sawing through the bars of his cell.

In Pocatello, Officer Reid was walking with the man on the platform of the station. Wickham was unshackled. "What would prevent me from running away from you?" he asked the officer. "No," replied Mr. Reid. "You have a gun, I suppose?" the prisoner asked. "I've a good mind to make a break for it—I don't believe you could hit me," Officer Reid made no comment on Wickham's conversation and the prisoner finally decided "that he just as well not try to run at that time."

Wickham is being held in Ogdens pending the arrival of another escaped murderer who was captured in Salt Lake and who is being returned to San Quentin by two California officers. The officers and their prisoner are expected to reach Ogdens tonight.

### AUTO USED BY BANK ROBBERS RETURNED HERE

After having been stolen and used as one of the principal factors in the Sugar bank robbery at Salt Lake a few days ago, the Nash automobile has been returned to its garage by P. J. O'Carroll, manager of the Pacific Nash company in Ogdens.

Mr. O'Carroll said the automobile seemed to be as good as ever with the exception that it had been cut in the top through which the bandits planned to fire upon their pursuers. Furthermore the name plate was removed by the thieves, he said.

### Logan Officials Back Baseball Movement

Mayor William Howell of Logan and President Luther M. Howell of the Logan chamber of commerce have written representatives of the Ogdens baseball club endorsing the movement started here a few weeks ago relative to the forming of a new baseball league with Ogdens, Brigham, Layton, and Tremonton represented together with Logan and Smithfield.

These men are anxious to see plans mature for the baseball parade, which is scheduled for October 5.

Steps to entertain the visitors at Logan have been started by these officials with the hope of forming the new organization when the representatives of the two clubs meet at that city.

### Sugar Beet Digging Gets Well Underway

Beet digging has started in the northern section of the state according to S. M. Edgley, vice president of the Amalgamated Sugar company. In all parts of the state the outlook is bright for a successful year, the crop from present indications to be even larger than last season, he said.

The beets from the Ogdens district will be shipped north to Smithfield and Logan for at least three more weeks to those factories until the repairs being made on the Ogdens factory are completed, it is said.

Repairs to the Ogdens plant alone total more than \$100,000 while repairs for all of the plants owned by the local company will total more than \$1,600,000, it is said.

### Greenband Combines Two Hide Companies

Jacob Greenband, proprietor of the Western Hide & Tanning company, announced today he had purchased the Utah Wool & Hide company and the stock of goods of that company from Ben Adams and had consolidated his old and his new business on Wall avenue. Mr. Greenband said he would look into the advisability of erecting a new building for his business.

### BUTTE MAN IS DOPED, ROBBED

James McCormack Tells of Meeting Strangers, a "Nip" and Unconsciousness

Doped by two men and robbed of \$500 in cash and \$200 in Liberty bonds, according to his own story, James McCormack, of Butte, Mont., was removed from an Oregon Short Line train at 9:35 o'clock last night and taken to the police station in an unconscious condition.

McCormack, when he regained consciousness, told Sergeant A. H. Stevens and Detective W. A. Taylor that he had been working in the harvest fields and, having made his "nip" for the season, was en route to California to visit his relatives until after Christmas.

At the depot at McCammon, Idaho, he met two men, he said, one six feet high, dark complexioned, who wore a light smock, khaki pants and shirt. The other, a medium height man, was dressed in a blue suit and a dark hat. Both men were clean shaven.

Displaying a bottle of vanilla extract, the taller man of the two suggested a little "nip." McCormack agreed and soon lost consciousness. When he awoke, he discovered he had been "rolled" and his money and bonds taken from him.

Word was immediately sent from Ogdens to Idaho cities and latest reports indicate that one of the men alleged to have robbed McCormack had been arrested at Rexburg.

McCormack had recovered from the effects of the drug this morning and set out for Rexburg to identify, if there, the man who is being held there.

### Japanese Who Fought Robber Back on Job

George Kawamura, Japanese employee of the Kennedy Cafeteria, whose efforts in protecting his employer's property averted a possible robbery, is recovering from the effects of the wounds suffered at the hands of the holdup, according to the police.

Notwithstanding that he suffered eight gashes in the head when his opponent hit him with a gold chisel, the man has left the hospital and is returned to his work.

Angus Kennedy, manager of the cafeteria, said that the blow seemed capable of cracking a man's skull, one especially, which seemed heavy enough to fell an ox. The robber has not been found.

"What she says is true," asserted her husband. "It is our baby come to life and we do not believe anything else."

They took the child to a physician, who said it was fully matured. Both children were tongue-tied and look alike in all respects.

### WILL GO SWORDFISHING IN ARMY BALLOON, SAYS OFFICER

SAN FRANCISCO.—Any unwary swordfish who comes up in the vicinity of the Catalina Islands is liable to have a noose slipped over his pointed nose. At the end of the rope will be Major J. C. McCoy, the first balloon pilot in the Army Air Service who will recline in the swaying basket of an army balloon.

Major McCoy is contemplating such action as an effective measure to combat the high cost of swords for use as side arms on the dress uniforms of United States Army officers.

### BEAT GOVERNMENT RULE. VIENNA, Sept. 24.—The partial de-control of grain has sent prices up to 200 per cent above the official price.
