TWO FEATURES ADDED TO SHOW

Keller Gets Down to Work at Eagles' Gym; Young to Meet Johnson

Terry Keller, well known Ogden pitcher, who is matched to meet Billie Maxon of Bay City, Mich., here Wednesday, October 6, started the finishing touches of his training for the 15-round tilt at the Eagles gymnasium yesterday afternoon. Keller worked out with Frankie Harris, Kid Johnson and others during the afternoon and showed a world of class.

Maxon, the heavy who has been showing a world of class in the east, is due to arrive during the latter part of the present week from Michigan. He is a husky youth, tips the beams at 192 pounds and has a right and left that have put many of the best bats in the land away, including Fred Felt, Billie Mince, Homer Smith, Gabby Martin, Jim Flynn and numerous others. During the past three months Maxon has been traveling along at a champion's clip and is coming to Ogden with the hope of returning east with another victory dangling at his belt.

On arrival here Maxon will establish his training quarters at the five station. He will be accompanied by his manager.

REGARDED AS COMER

Maxon is regarded as Jack Keenan, manager of the world's champion, Jack Dempsey, as one of the logical contenders for the crown now worn by the Utah. He is rated by sport experts also as one of the best bats in the United States, one who has come to the fore fast.

Keller, on the other hand, has been going great guns of late and has defeated twelve men during the past three months. In every one of these contests he won by a K. O.

Dock Keller, manager of the local aspirant for the title, has arranged four matches for his star in the northwest following the local scrap after which he will prepare Terry for a scrap with Dempsey. This, however, hinges entirely on the outcome of the coming clash. If Keller is successful he will be the one to be pitted against the champion while if Maxon is the lucky youth, the honors will travel east with the Michigan lad an opponent for the Utah in the near future.

Jack Keenan, manager of Dempsey, has consented to have his champion clash with the winner, either in Ogden, Salt Lake or New York City during the early part of December.

WORKING DAILY

Keller is working out daily at the Eagles gymnasium. He starts his daily workouts at 3 o'clock sharp daily. More than two hundred fans were present yesterday to witness the workout.

Al Young, well known local featherweight, and "Swede" Johnson will also be starred on the card, the main event to be 15 rounds, and the Young-Johnson go to be over the ten-round route. These two events, together with three other snappy events, will compose the card, with a total of 49 rounds of boxing.

The referee for the main event will not be named until Maxon arrives here from the east. It, however, looks between Harry Dowling, Bill Thornton and two other well known men.

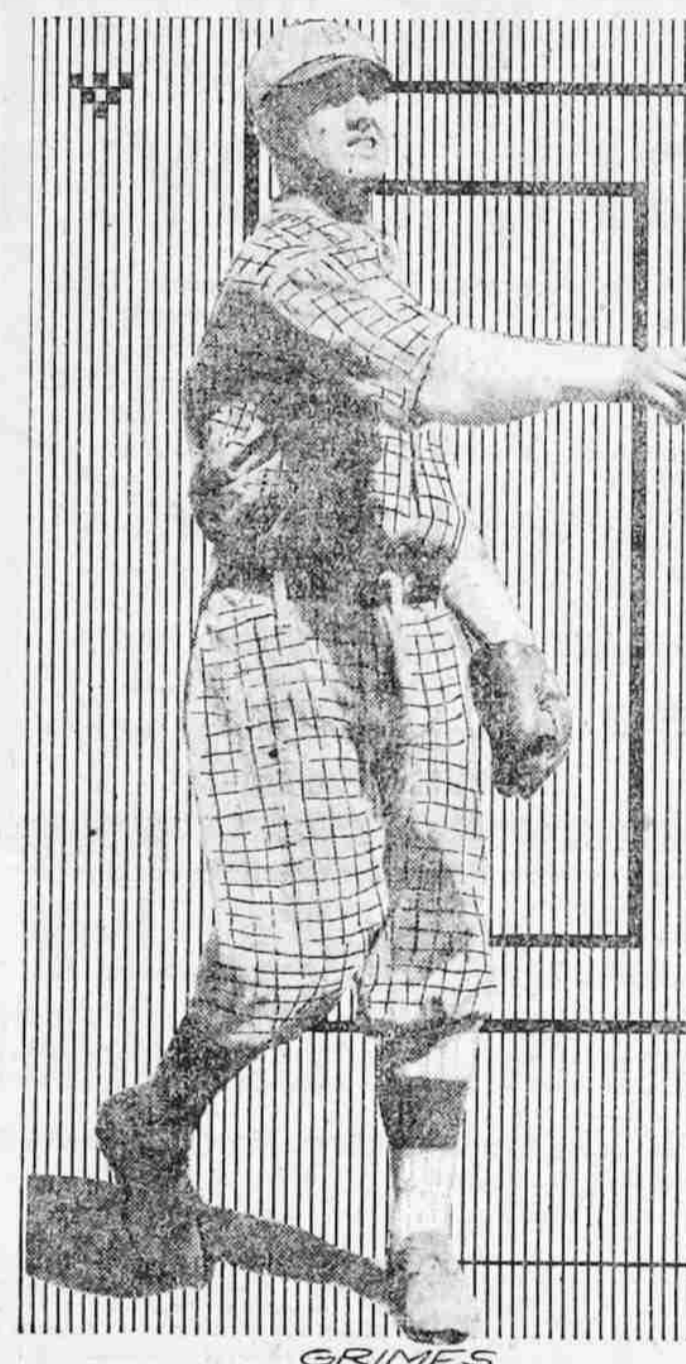

WALLER SIGNS

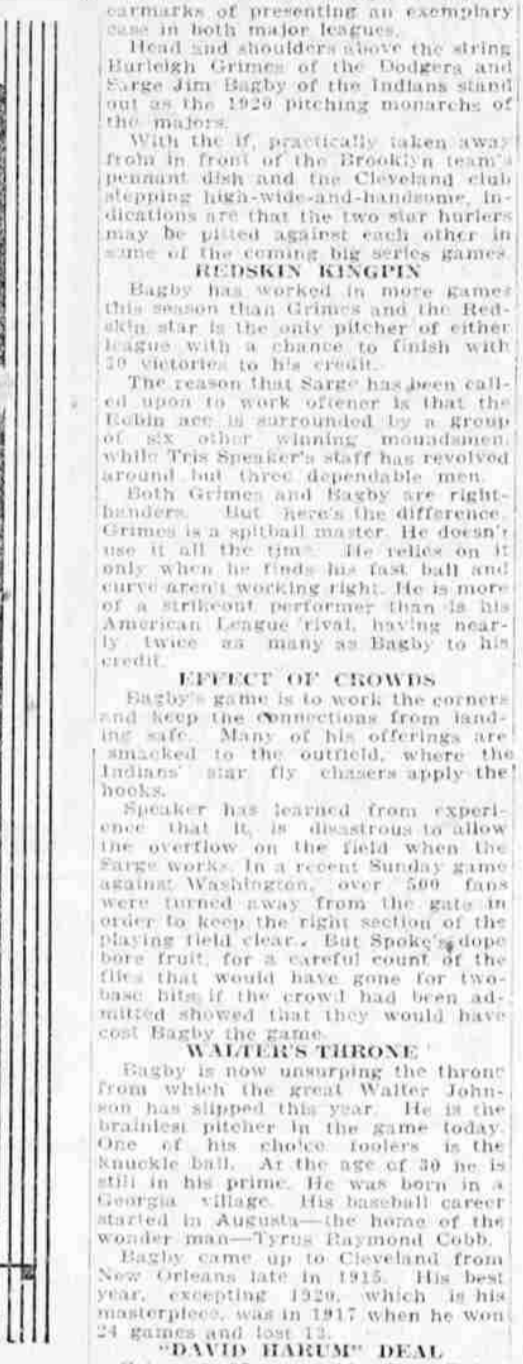

HERE'S DATA ON SHOOTING HOURS FOR DUCK SEASON

Hundreds of Ogdenites are polishing their shot guns for the initial hours of the season to be sounded Friday at sunrise. From all indications the season should be a thriller, with ducks plentiful, thus making the sport even better than in past seasons. The hours during which duck shooters may hunt during the 1920 season have been compiled by the state fish and game department. It should be borne in mind that shooting is permitted half an hour before sunrise. Shooting closes exactly at sunset. It is suggested that duck hunters clip the following table, which carries the hunting hours for every day during the season.

GIRL ATHLETES TO STAR IN MEET

Young Women of City Will Be Seen in Action in Snappy Card Saturday

What gives promise of being one of the most successful girls' athletic meets will be staged by Ogden community service next Saturday afternoon at Lester park, more than 400 young women of the city to take part in the various events.

The program, which is one of the two-day celebration which will open here Friday, will consist of the following events: Fifty-yard dash, 25-yard backward race, three-legged race, and driving contest, walking race, leap frog, a cracker eating contest. The first event will start at 4 o'clock sharp.

The young women entering the various events will enter in three classes. Class A is for young women who tip the beams at from 50 to 75 pounds. Class B is for young women of from 75 to 90 pounds, while Class C is for all over 90 pounds.

All young women entering in the games will appear in the regulation gymnasium costume. Winners in each event in each class will be awarded prizes which have been donated by local merchants. Three prizes will be awarded in each event.

Rumler Case to Be Heard Before Owners Of Coast Ball Clubs

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—A definite alignment of club owners on the Pacific Coast Baseball League to oppose any attempt to force William H. McCarthy of San Francisco from the presidency of the league because of his five-year suspension of Player Rumler of the Salt Lake club, following gambling charges, became apparent here today.

Dr. Charles H. Strub, president of the San Francisco Call today with saying that his club will be withdrawn from the league if the movement to reinstate Rumler is successful. J. C. Irving, owner of the Oakland club, also announced that he would stand by McCarthy.

A meeting of the directors will be held here Thursday to take final action on the Rumler case. McCarthy was compelled by the league constitution to call the meeting after five of the clubs had signed for the gathering, the Salt Lake club heading the list.

McCarthy announced yesterday that he would resign the presidency of the league if Rumler is reinstated.
