FEDERAL PROBE ORDERED ON BOOTLEGGERS DEATH

C., of the part taken by prohibition enforcement officers here in the killing of Robert Hedderly, an alleged bootlegger, who was shot in the progress of a liquor raid made by federal and police officers two weeks ago. Three federal and two police officers have been indicted by the county grand jury charged with involuntary manslaughter in the killing of Hedderly.
