FAVOR FEDERAL VOCATIONAL ACT

State Ready to Accept Provisions of Rehabilitation Measures

SALT LAKE, Sept. 29.—Through Governor Simon E. Benson, the state of Utah went on record yesterday as ready to accept the provisions of the federal vocational rehabilitation act.

ADDRESS BY CHIEF. The decision was reached at a meeting in the state school offices in the capitol, which was addressed by L. S. Hawkins, chief of the division of vocational education.

Present at the meeting were, in addition to Mr. Hawkins and the governor, L. J. Muir, state superintendent of public instruction, and George A. Eaton, superintendent of the state board of education, which is also the state board of vocational education.

LEGISLATURE MUST APPROVE

The acceptance by Governor Benson of the provisions of the federal act brings to the state a minimum of \$2,000, provided the state appropriates a like amount for the purposes of vocational rehabilitation.
