### Coach Twitchell of Box Elder Will Present First Class Lineup of Huskies Against Locals; Kilpatrick and Andrews Join Local Organization; A. A. Warriors Preparing for Aggie Contest

Jupiter Pluvius, who has been more on a "high" to the Ogden Athletic association athletes, has promised fair weather for Saturday and with such a promise made plans have been completed for the initial 1920 grid game of the season to be played on the local lot Saturday. The Boxelder high school team is one of the newest and fastest aggregations in the state and will mix with the Ogden A. A. stars in the matinee which is scheduled to be staged at Lorin Farr park, Saturday afternoon, the kickoff to be made at 2 o'clock.

The contest will no doubt be a first rate exhibition of the grid game as both teams will present heavy lines. The high school line, according to experts, will average more than 100 pounds while the line of the locals will tip the beams around 155.

Both backfields compare favorably as to weight, each being credited with having stars in the lineup. Coach Alvin Twitchell will bring a squad of thirty gridlers to Ogden to meet the locals and will start the contest with a team of speed merchants in line. Watkins and end L. Gibbs will back the strongest men on the Boxelder team.

The locals will present a crew of seasoned veterans, men who have all had college experience and who have shown their colors in speedy style. Harry Kilpatrick and Earl Andrews, former Salt Lake high school stars and both stars of the A-1 type, have joined the local organization and will be seen in action Saturday.

### Fogel States That \$17,000 Was Promised Mound Star to Turn Trick

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 30.—Horace E. Fogel, former president of the Philadelphia National League baseball club, is quoted in an item published today by the Inquirer as declaring that five attempts were made to "fix" the world series in recent years and that the evidence is in the archives of the major league officials and club owners.

The first attempt, according to Fogel's story, was made in 1905, when a trio of New York gamblers headed by Little Tim Sullivan, approached Rube Waddell, star pitcher of the Philadelphia Athletics and offered him \$17,000 if he would not pitch in the world series against the New York Giants, who won the mastery work of Christy Mathewson.

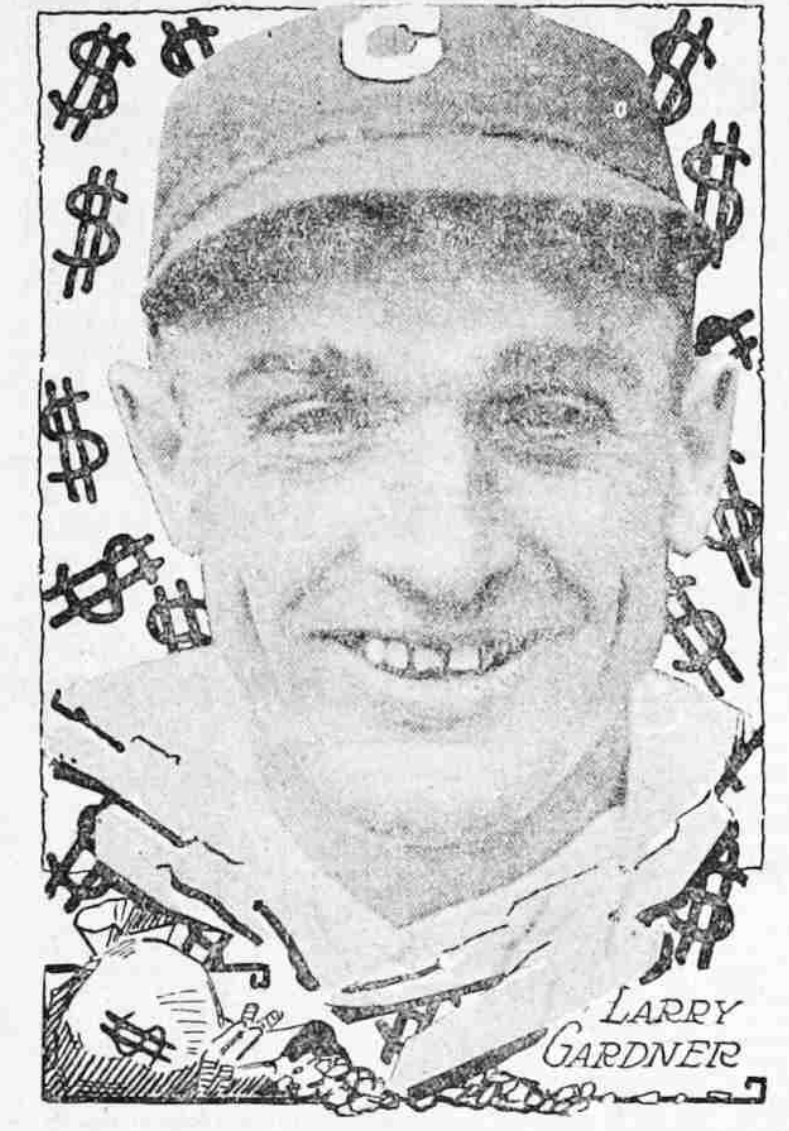
# GAMES POSTPONED
