LENROOT RAPS LEAGUE PACT

Wisconsin Senator Addresses Utah Republicans on Party Aims

SALT LAKE, Oct. 6.—Senator Irvine L. Lenroot of Wisconsin, spoke in Salt Lake yesterday afternoon. He assailed the league of nations, taking special raps at Article X and the Shantung agreement. The Wisconsin senator spent the day in Utah, coming to Salt Lake from Ogden. He spoke in the ladies' parlors in the Hotel Utah at 3:30 o'clock in the afternoon. His time was limited to less than an hour, to make possible his early arrival in Provo, where he spoke last night. Senator Lenroot spoke first of finances and taxation. He said that it would be a national calamity for the people of Utah to refuse to return to the United States. He said that no person in Washington or elsewhere knows as much about the financial problems of the country as the senior senator from Utah.

"NO FOURTH OF JULY"

"There will be no occasion to celebrate the Fourth of July if Governor Cox is elected president," said Senator Lenroot. "For, if that is done, the United States will enter the league of nations and will be bound by article X to engage in war and to fight for every member of the league. That means a surrender of the liberty that we enjoy, and we shall no longer celebrate the day that stands for liberty. What would have happened if we had a league of nations in 1776? The Stars and Stripes would not now be floating over us, but instead we would have the Union Jack. This part of the United States still would have been part of Mexico if the league had been in existence in 1848 and Cuba would still be a subject of Spain had we been a member of the league in 1898. But we had no league then, and we are not a member of the league now, and thank God we never shall fight on the side of the oppressor." "In referring to the Shantung agreement, Senator Lenroot said that should we enter the league, we would be bound to assist Japan. "Germany took Shantung in a way that was not right," said the speaker. "Nobody defends the action of Germany. But now we have taken that land with its 30,000,000 people, away from Germany and have given it to Japan. Nobody defends the action of Japan. President Wilson refers to treaties which cannot be violated. Evidently, according to our president, questions of right and wrong, and of geography, as he has not been so particular about violating treaties in Europe. If we should enter the league and then China should awake in her power with her 400,000,000 people and go forth to reclaim the land and the people that Japan has stolen from her, we would be bound by article X to help Japan in the conflict. Speaking of Armenia Senator Lenroot said that England would take the oil fields, France the copper mines and Italy and Greece the agricultural lands of Turkey and that they would give to the United States, Armenia, with its millions of starving citizens. That was the agreement upon which they asked President Wilson to take the responsibility, and upon which he asked congress to give him authority to assume a mandate over Armenia, the speaker said.

"HIS IDEA OF HONOR"

"The advocates of the league propose the most dishonorable thing imaginable," said Senator Lenroot. "They propose that we enter the league, assume the responsibility, and then, when the test comes, do not live up to the agreement. It is just like the case of Germany and Belgium, for Cox and Wilson say we can treat it like 'a scrap of paper.' Republicans have different ideas of honor. I want an association or league of whatever you want to call it, but in it we shall enter free and independent and remain free and independent. We seek no advantages. "Our boys fought so our flag would not be hauled down and the German eagle put up in its place. I blame Cox more than Wilson, who is an idealist and always has been behind school walls. Cox is practical and has rubbed shoulders with men. He is alive to the situation and knows what he is doing." Senator Lenroot said that he had confidence that the people would send Harding and Coolidge to Washington, and confidence in the people of Utah that they would return Senator Smoot to the senate and give the Republican ticket a handsome majority.

POISON TABLETS FATAL TO BABY

One Salt Lake Child Dies and Two Others Critically Ill

SALT LAKE, Oct. 6.—As the result of swallowing a quantity of poisonous tablets yesterday afternoon, George H. Seal, 3 1/2 years of age, son of George H. and Ingrid C. Jensen Seal, died at 9:30 o'clock last night and two other children are seriously ill at their homes. "Bobby Jack" James, 2 1/2 years of age, son of Harold James, 318 West Sixth South street, and Lorena Snarr, 3 years of age, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Snarr, 374 West Sixth South street, are the other victims of the accidental poisoning, which occurred at their homes late last night and hopes are held for their entire recovery.

The two baby boys were visiting at the Snarr home, and the three children obtained the poison from a bottle hidden in a pile of wood in the back yard of the Snarr home. Lucille Snarr, 14 years of age, found them chewing the tablets containing the deadly poison, and noting the poison label on the bottle, she hastened to take them to their homes. When his son was brought home, ex-claiming in ecstasy over the taste of the poison tablets, Mr. Seal, who is a railroad man, immediately called a tax cab and took him and the two other children to a downtown physician. While undergoing treatment, all three children became seriously ill, and the Seal tot tapered into unconsciousness, from which he never recovered. The two other children were removed to their homes after six hours' treatment. The Seal boy was born in Salt Lake March 11, 1917. It is thought the poison was thrown into the woodpile by former occupants of the Snarr house, who moved away some time ago.

TAKE GAS RATE RAISE PLEA UNDER ADVERTISEMENT

SALT LAKE, Oct. 6.—Following the closing of the hearing of the application of the Utah Gas and Coke company for a revaluation of its property and permission to put into effect a new schedule of rates yesterday, the matter was taken under advisement by the public utilities commission of Utah. One exhibit presented by the company, giving "schedule B" of suggested rates, proposed for the first 300 cubic feet of gas used by a consumer a minimum charge of 75 cents; for the next 700 cubic feet, 20 cents per 100; for the next 2000 cubic feet, 18 1/2 cents per hundred; for the next 17,000 cubic feet, 17 cents per 100, and for all over 20,000 cubic feet, 16 cents per 100.

GIANT GAS WELL NEAR CHEYENNE IS AFIRE; ONE KILLED

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 5.—One man is dead, four are dying and flames unchecked are shooting two hundred and fifty feet into the air from the Midwest Ohio gas well 25 miles southwest of Basin, Wyo., as the result of a spark caused by friction of the drilling apparatus at the well Sunday.

The dead man is a driller named Kramer, Joe Henry, a tool dresser, and three other unidentified men are dying from burns. Physicians were sent from Basin because, of impossibility of transporting the injured men overland from the Buffalo oil fields. There is no communication with the camp by telephone.

The flames from the well can be seen for a hundred miles across the country. It is said to be the largest gas well yet found. The derrick was destroyed.

BOISE, Oct. 6.—Miss Jesse Godfrey of Lansing, Mich., has been appointed state bacteriologist to succeed Paul A. Mader, resigned. Miss Godfrey is at present assistant state bacteriologist in the state of Michigan.

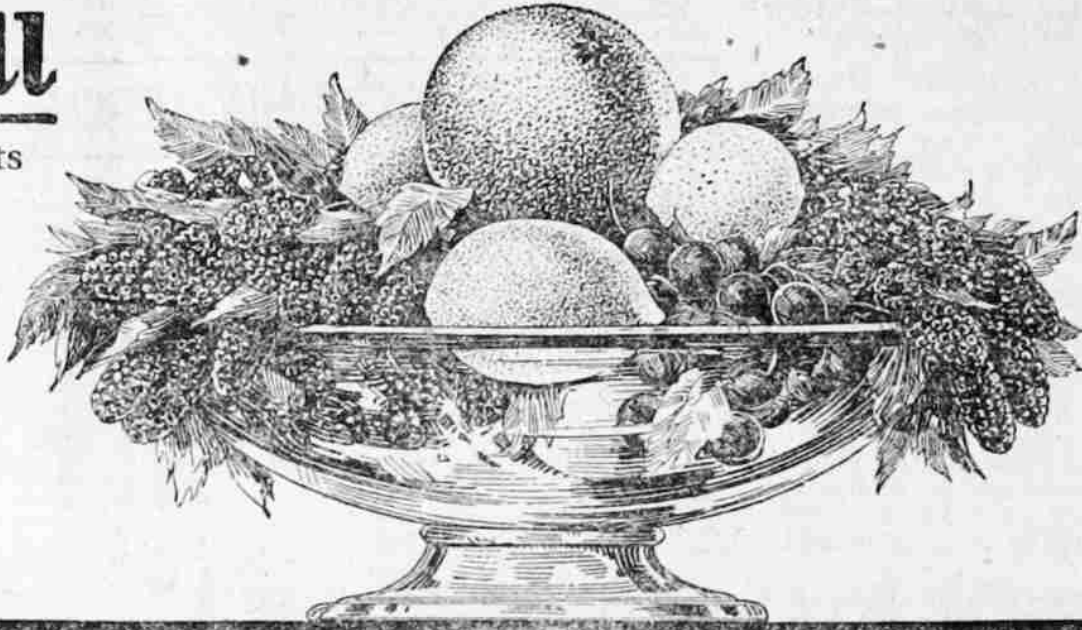
HEAVY SNOWFALLS IN IDAHO'S TETON COUNTRY

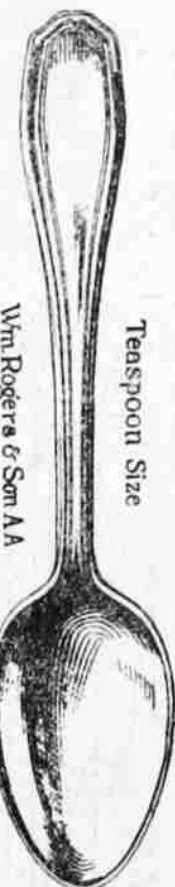

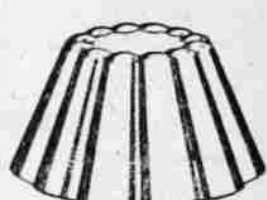
